

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Dear sisters and brothers of First Presbyterian Church,

The grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you!

The session of First Presbyterian Church has made the commitment, along with several local organizations, including other congregations, to create a new movement called the Johnson County Interfaith Cluster. JCIC is one of many such initiatives across the country being created by The Gamaliel Project based in Chicago and dedicated to grassroots faith-based organizing for justice.

We can anticipate blessings from this shared ministry. Without giving you all the details, faith-based community organizing builds the interior life of congregations through conversations and careful listening. It extends our relationships to diverse people of other congregations and organizations, thereby knitting together our local community. It identifies specific needs that people experience that are barriers to them creating a good, safe life for themselves. It holds elected officials and other civil leaders accountable for moving beyond mere words and actually fostering change that will benefit everyone, especially persons of color who are struggling.

Let us face this reality: Only through accountability does true change come.

Why should faithful people engage in this ministry that can sometimes invite us beyond our comfort zone? In a time when economic and political systems exploited people, Jesus taught that faithfulness means seeing our first priority as the realm of God and its right relationships of justice, mercy and faith. In a democracy such as ours, people of faith have the same calling. They also have greater opportunity to confront exploitation and insist on change. Indeed, it is our patriotic and spiritual duty to do so.

JCIC is an opportunity for you and me to transform our region through relationships, even friendships. Session and I need your assistance to follow Jesus and seek first the realm of God and its justice. I have done this non-partisan work in two communities in which I have lived, and I can assure you that people-power can make an enormous difference to lift the burdens of injustice. Accordingly, I know that for this effort to be successful, we need many compassionate, justice-seeking people from our congregation to assist.

Below this pastor's page I give you an outline of how faith-based community organizing works in practice. Will you help lead in the creation of right relationships in our region and perhaps beyond it? I close with a quotation from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., found in his Letter from Birmingham Jail. It was addressed to white moderates (now the progressives in our day) who meant well yet actually blocked the



progress of the Civil Rights Movement:

First, I must confess that over the last few years I have been gravely disappointed with the white moderate. I have almost reached the regrettable conclusion that the Negro's great stumbling block in the stride toward freedom is not the White Citizen's Council-er or the Ku Klux Klanner, but the white moderate who is more devoted to "order" than to justice; who prefers a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice; who constantly says "I agree with you in the goal you seek, but I can't agree with your methods of direct action;" who paternalistically feels he can set the timetable for another man's freedom; who lives by the myth of time and who constantly advises the Negro to wait until a 'more convenient season.' Shallow understanding from people of goodwill is more frustrating than absolute misunderstanding from people of ill will. Lukewarm acceptance is much more bewildering than outright rejection.

How does faith-based community organizing work?

- The first step lies in an effort to build a core team of approximately 10–15 persons from First Presbyterian Church to help lead.
- The core team members will be trained and then asked to interview up to six other persons (members and visitors) in our congregation. The more volunteers we have for the core team, the fewer interviews any one person needs to do.
- Interviews are kept to an hour, if at all possible. The
 persons interviewed by the core team can be those
 known to the interviewer or not. Although called an
 interview, a typical interview is more like a
 conversation. A good guideline is that a person being
 interviewed should do 60-70% of the talking, although
 the interviewer is not being constrained from jumping

in when appropriate. The goal is to build relationships with several people, an outcome that will inevitably strengthen our congregation's human ties over time. The interviewer will not broadly share the content of the interviews with others, except in one specific detail, mentioned in the next bullet point.

- The persons who are interviewed are asked to tell their life stories and the interviewer will share parts of his or her own, as time allows. This sharing builds mutual relationships in our congregation. It is especially intended that two specific questions will be answered by the person interviewed:
 - *What circumstances has given this person a compassionate heart for those who hurt?
 - *What does this person believe are the deepest needs in our community and region that call for a response? This is the one answer that will be shared broadly, although without association with any particular name.
- The core team members carry the answers received to the second question to a meeting with all of the other organizational representatives who engaged in a similar process in their respective organizations. Meeting together in small groups for dialogue, these persons together identify common concerns and prioritize them. Special weight is given to the answers of those who come from diverse experiences of racial disadvantage or even oppression. They bring the wisdom that comes from pain, while the rest of us bring our power and privilege to stand with them.
- Based on these priorities, strategic teams are created of diverse folks who study the selected issues, come up with desired outcomes, create effective strategies

- to reach those outcomes, train persons to work these strategies, and then implement these strategies using the people-power built on relationships created by the whole organizing process.
- Often the chosen strategy involves meeting as a large gathering of the faithful with community leaders and then asking these leaders to make commitments to specific actions for justice. Follow-up large gatherings typically are held a year later to celebrate victories, praise the community leaders who keep their promises, reinforce accountability for those who do not, and ask for new commitments. Again, only through accountability does change come.
- The organization begins with small achievable victories, such as what transpired Friday night, February 2. At that meeting the mayor, city manager and chief of police all committed to be as vigorous in pursuing investigations of racial incidents as the leaders in places such as the Quad Cities and Des Moines. They seemed to realize that they could do more to proactively battle racism and promised to rise to the occasion.
- This process repeats itself annually, although the
 volunteer commitment is only for this year unless the
 choice is made to sign up to be on a strategy planning
 study group that may have a longer life. A 2018
 volunteer, after being trained, will mostlikely attend
 three large gatherings and spend 6 hours interviewing
 people.

From the Deacon's Bench

Part of the role of Deacons is to foster relationships within our church family and nurture those relationships through various caring ministries. Each person in the congregation has been assigned two Deacons. These Deacon contacts are meant to supplement but not replace the need for pastoral care. We will hold our annual "Meet Your Deacons" event on March 18 before and after worship. This is a great time to meet other people who live in your neighborhood!

January 2018 Session Highlights

Clerk of Session, Nancy Weber

The session met January 16, 2018 in Coover Lounge at 7:00 p.m. Pastor Sam called the meeting to order and lit the Christ candle. Elder Nancy Gardner spoke about Changes, Fears, and Faith, and read Psalm 27:1-3. She then led us in prayer.

Clerk passed around information sent by PCUSA on per capita, and will write a short explanation of per capita for the newsletter.

The birth of Oliver Layne Sheetz, son of Anna and Layne Sheetz, on January 14, 2018 was noted. The death of Dick Dustin on January 16, 2018 was noted.

Treasurer Larry Bruner reported that we ended up with a positive balance of \$1,800 for 2017. This is good news, especially considering that we launched the Capital Campaign.

Elder and Finance moderator Dale Kraus presented a motion which was approved: The December 2017 approved budget for 2018 was rescinded and replaced with the revised 2018 budget, which was distributed at the session meeting.

Pastor Sam left the room, and session members discussed his terms of call. Is he doing the job he is called to do? All present were asked for their input on positives and also on suggestions or concerns. An overwhelming number of positive comments were offered, and a motion was passed affirming the 2018 terms of call.

Minutes of the December 19, 2017 stated session meeting were approved. A motion from Worship and Celebration Ministry to keep the summer Sunday worship service at 10:30 a.m. was approved. A motion was approved via email to hold the Congregational meeting Sunday, February 11, 2018 after 10:30 services to address the Pastor's Terms of Call and elect Jeri Smith and Judy Terry as Deacons.

Session approved signing the covenant for membership in Johnson County Interfaith Cluster for the annual fee of \$600. Also approved were the four special annual offerings suggested by PC (USA) and up to three special offerings to be determined by Servanthood.

A grant of up to \$20,000 to New Creation Church from the Burianek Trust funds for the purchase of a 15person van for their daycare was approved. It was recommended that New Creation Church plan setasides for routine maintenance and upkeep and investigate the need for seat belts and booster seats.

Session voted to make Assistant to Equipping Minister Judy Whitford half-time for the next two months and accepted Assistant to Minister of Worship Erin Landsee's resignation. Elder Nancy Gardner expressed appreciation for all Erin has done for FPC. We have really benefitted from her being here.

Elder Richard Van Rheeden reported on the recent Presbytery meeting, held January 13, 2018 at FPC. The Presbytery will be restructuring staffing and committees. New officers were installed. Presbytery is welcoming elders to volunteer to serve with the Presbytery, striving to make it broader and more inclusive. Richard encouraged session members to sign up.

An overture to General Assembly concerning ecclesiastical officers we passed in November 2017 was passed by Presbytery. We are the lead on this. It will go to General Assembly.

Elder Nancy Gardner reported that Erin Landsee's idea of Parents' Night Out was a good one. Elder Gardner is taking this on. Friday, January 26, 2018 there will be 11 kids. It's fun, and she encourages session members to help out as needed in the future.

CF Synod School is going to take more time to plan, so VBS may still be happening in some form.

Elder Van Rheeden announced that a Cedar Rapids Robert Burns supper would take place next Saturday night, January 27, 2018. There may still be FPC interest in this. Session voted to approve a three session member team to pursue the notion of hosting our own Burns supper.

Elder Van Rheeden reported that over \$6,000 was taken in via the Giving Kiosk in December 2017. A large chunk was for the cookie walk, some was for the capital campaign fund, and some for the general fund. The giving kiosk is offering convenience and the ability to track donations, but is perhaps not the best way to give for large donations due to the 1.5% surcharge.

Pastor Sam closed the meeting with prayer. The next session meeting will be held February 20, 2018 at 7 p.m., in Coover Lounge.





Did you know?



- An estimated 130 million cell phones are discarded annually in the U.S. alone.

won't be responsible for any diapering.




