Dear sisters and brothers of First Presbyterian Church,

The grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you!

Calling all faithful people who love God and neighbor! Please say yes!

Pastor's Post Sometime in the next few weeks you may be approached by someone from church asking you to have a "one-on-one" interview (conversation). He or she is asking you to sit down for 30 minutes to an hour and share your life story, in as much detail as you wish. Please say yes! It should be fun for you, you will be part of an important process in our congregation to develop deeper and broader relationships, and your input is needed!

The person who interviews you especially wants to know two things from you.

- First, what happened in your life that has made you such a compassionate person? Put another way, what events shaped you so much that you feel that it is in your self-interest to ensure that all people get justice?
- Second, what is happening in our region to people that bothers you? What is the issue that agitates you into wanting to join with other concerned people to take action for the sake of justice?

Your life story, and the events in it that made you into the compassionate person you are, is confidential between you and the person with whom you speak. They are, after all, your story and your life-shaping events!

Your answer to the second question will be combined with the answers of approximately 90 of your friends and neighbors who participate at First Presbyterian Church. Your answers about your concerns for our community will be shared—without names attached—with members of the 15-plus congregations and organizations that are now also part of Johnson County Interfaith Cluster (JCIC). They will also be doing one-on-ones with their people!

Put together, this input from hundreds of faithful persons in our community, combined with information gained from research, will allow the new JCIC to set an agenda for regional social change around issues of racial justice. This sort of initiative is called faith-based community organizing, which is the DNA of JCIC. Its objective is the beloved community of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

As we learned beginning in church school, peace without justice is impossible. Achieving justice often requires us to join hands with others in the community in order to have impact. JCIC is creating a community of joined hands and hearts.

Fifty years ago April 4 . . . Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was gunned down in a Memphis, TN motel balcony. want rain without thunder and lightning. They want the ocean without the awful roar of its many waters. This

Fifty years ago . . . the Kerner Commission reported on civil and racial unrest in the United States and observed that "our nation is moving toward two societies, one black, one white – separate and unequal."

In the past 5 years . . . the nation has experienced an uptick in civil unrest reminiscent of the 1960s in places like Ferguson, Baltimore, Charlottesville and St. Louis. As Dr. King noted, "A riot is the language of the unheard." The NAACP has noted recently that in spite of the election of an African-American president, the American experience of relationships between races is eroding and that increasing civil unrest and even violence is a distinct possibility.

In a speech in 1852 . . . Frederick Douglass said, "If there is no struggle there is no progress. Those who profess to favor freedom and yet deprecate agitation are men who want crops without plowing up the ground; they

want rain without thunder and lightning. They want the ocean without the awful roar of its many waters. This struggle may be a moral one, or it may be a physical one, and it may be both moral and physical, but it must be a struggle. Power concedes nothing without a demand. It never did and it never will."

In 2018, you are invited to be a part of a non-violent struggle by the simple acts of

- expanding your network of relationships
- listening
- sharing
- · gathering and
- insisting that the regional, state and national conversations and policies around race change to the benefit of persons of every color and background.

Applications are now being accepted for the William B. and Sharon P. Oglesby Scholarship at The University of Iowa – deadline is June 5.

In 2002, William and Sharon Oglesby, members of FPC, made a gift to The University of Iowa Foundation to establish a scholarship for deserving UI students who are members of First Presbyterian Church in Iowa City.

"Sharon and I have worked in education at the high school and university levels our whole lives," William Oglesby said, "and we believe education is the

biggest factor not only in one's financial success, but in one's aesthetic enjoyment of life." Added Sharon Oglesby, "The scholarship seemed like a way to blend our lifelong commitments to education and to the Presbyterian Church." The Oglesby Scholarship is awarded based on need and merit.

Eligibility Criteria:

- The applicant must be a member of First Presbyterian Church, Iowa City, Iowa.
- The applicant must be attending The University of Iowa in 2017-18.
- The applicant must have a minimum GPA of 3.0.
- Application must be made using the form available in the church office.
- The scholar(s) will be recommended by the FPC Scholarship Committee to The University of Iowa Foundation. The grant will be awarded by The University of Iowa Financial Aid office.
- The application and all supportive documentation must be postmarked or delivered to the church office (2701 Rochester Ave., Iowa City, Iowa 52245) no later than June 5, 2018.

All applicants, recipients and those not receiving a scholarship award, will be notified no later than the last Friday in June. One or more scholarships will be awarded.

Thank you from one of Jesus' Matthew 25:40 families!

Four weeks ago a local immigrant family connected to elder and church member Michelle Bessman through a child she knows at school. The family was in need of our immediate assistance. The sole wage earner, with no prior criminal history, had been detained by the authorities for three weeks based on a suspicion that he was insufficiently documented. The family with four US-born children, ages 9 months to 10 years old, was in immediate need of:



- Money for rent, telephone, heating and electricity, and water (\$365) and
- Tangible items: Pampers (size 4), wipes, shampoo, toilet paper, toothpaste, soaps for bathing, dishes and clothes and food (nothing fresh, please).

Goods and \$ were collected for this family. The goods were given immediately and the money is being shared to meet the family's need in \$500 installments through the Center for Worker Justice. This is how we protect the family from financial predators and insure it is being used for needs over a longer duration.

The immigrant family from Michelle's school asked her to thank you (FPC members and friends) for your generous support. Now four weeks after his car slid into a ditch, the father has been released from ICE detainment. The family is currently waiting for further notice from ICE to know if the father will be allowed to stay in the United States or if he will be deported. The whole family would appreciate continued prayer support as they face an uncertain future.

Michelle adds her thanks to the family's for your generous response to its need.

Hello, Ms. Bergman,

My name is Karen Seals. I have not met you, but I want to send a word of thanks to you, the choir, and instrumentalists for your upcoming performance of my arrangement of "Don't Be Weary, Traveler" (tomorrow, March 18).

Periodically I search online for information on various performances which occur from time to time across the nation. Last evening I found your Master Choir Schedule, March–April, 2018.

Your church happens to be located in the city where my father died so many years ago (1957, Veterans Hospital). My mother also has passed away (1999), but this is not yet noted in my dedication printed on the music (hopefully upon a next reprint, this will be noted). I'm so grateful to have been blessed with two of the most loving parents a person could have. I will be thinking of them and thinking also of you and the choir as you perform my arrangement tomorrow.

I also will be thinking of my late husband, Dr. Thomas Johnson, who passed away eight years ago this coming June 17th. Some of his ancestors (great grandparents) endured the atrocities of slavery. May God forever bless them and all who endured unbearable things we cannot fully imagine. Their music leaves a lasting tribute to their unmovable faith and endurance.

Thank you again for your upcoming performance and for your own special tribute to a strong people, to their faith, and to God. As my composition professor stated after I wrote this arrangement, "People in Heaven are thanking you for remembering their music." They are thanking you, too.

I wish you all the very best in your endeavors and your ministries. May God bless all of you and your dear families.





The session met March 20, 2018 in Coover Lounge at 7:00 p.m. Pastor Sam called the meeting to order and lit the Christ candle. John Barr, from the Capital Campaign Session voted to post the fee Implementation Committee (CCIT), presented two motions, which were both approved by Session:

- 1.) From the CCIT Technology Subcommittee: That we now proceed with installing a ceilingmounted motorized screen & projector in Ryerson Hall, at the cost of \$10,548.48.
- 2.) From the CCIT Kitchen Subcommittee, and Buildings & Grounds: That McCreedy-Ruth Construction of Riverside be selected as the general contractor for the kitchen renovation project, subject to a quote that Session finds acceptable.

Session approved minutes of the following meetings: February 20, 2018 stated session meeting, March

11, 2018 special session meeting, and the February 25, 2018 special session meeting to welcome new members. A special session meeting and potluck on March 27, 2018 to welcome new confirmands was motion on revision of the

schedule for use of the kiosk near the kiosk, with Finance and Stewardship committees delegated to write and post the text. Also approved was the use of 200 feet of cat5e ethernet cable to run a temporary hard wire connection to test for better live stream video and sound. The test could be on a Sunday morning service or for one of Pastor Sam's short videos. The purpose of the test is to plan for a better streaming service in the future.

Anna Sheetz, Minister of Equipping, explained a motion from Equipping, which Session approved: To explore the Dodekah Ministry (meant for discipleship for high schoolers and Treasurer Larry Bruner reported that, adults) within the context of the planning process.

> A motion from Equipping, to order pumpkins for a Fall Pumpkin fundraiser that will help fund the proposed Dodekah Ministry, was approved.

Session voted to approve a request that Pastor Paul Akin be officially invited to assist with FPC Stewardship leadership this year.

Session met with FPC member Gary Olson about becoming a Commissioned Ruling Elder. Gary spoke about his faith journey and what becoming a CRE means to him. Session voted to approve his request and send to Presbytery. Elder Richard Van Rheeden will be his supporter.

Session authorized B&G to investigate options for repair or replacement of the mower.

Elder Richard Van Rheeden talked about the use of 200 feet of cat5e ethernet cable to run a temporary hard wire connection to test for better live stream video and sound. A short discussion followed about the quality of the worship service music over the Internet. There was concern expressed that it does not sound good—the piano, the brass, etc. Richard is asking for feedback from Session and FPC members, and to be specific as can be.

Elder Ann Grosscup closed the meeting with prayer. The next session meeting will be held April 17, 2018 at 7 p.m., in Coover Lounge.

Did you know that FPC has a representative on the Board of Directors of Ecumenical Towers Corporation? The board oversees the management of the Ecumenical Towers building. The apartments for 81 low-income seniors are located at 320 E Washington St. The board sponsors four events throughout the year for the residents. The fall dinner is one of the events and was on November 16. The residents look forward to the dinner that has been catered by Mrs. Ila Miller of Kalona for several years. While the residents were getting seated and eating their meals, Pastor John McKinstry and two First Christian Church members provided musical entertainment. At another event during the week of Christmas, the board distributes "Santa Sacks," which include a sack with fresh fruit, candy, and envelopes of cocoa and microwave popcorn, to each resident. The last two annual events are a soup supper in March, which took place on March 15, and an ice cream social in July. The walls in the Community Room, the lobby and the hall on the ground level received a new coat of paint, the insulation of some pipes on the first floor was completed and new carpeting was installed late last fall. The windows on the north side will be replaced as soon as we have the money to do so. If you have not had a chance to visit this wonderful home for low-income seniors, stop by sometime. Capital Campaign Implementation Taskforce (CCIT) Update

The following is a detailed update to our CCIT annual congregational report, published in the 2017 Report of the Year (copies available in the church office):

- To date, we have received campaign pledges totaling \$1,139,000, with \$815,551 collected so far in donations. Keep in mind that we are only in our second year of campaign collections, so we are grateful to God to be ahead of schedule in actual giving.
- 2. Thus far administrative costs, including office supplies and event costs for our fundraising efforts, have totaled \$68,195.
- 3. Before the end of 2016, two high-priority campaign projects were completed at a cost of \$201,575: the parking lot was resurfaced, and the organ was refurbished and returned to service.
- 4. During 2017, the CCIT and the FPC Building & Grounds Committee, with approval of Session and the Presbytery of Easter Iowa, secured the services of Walker Cohen Lorentzen Architects, as design consultant for the boiler/air handler and elevator projects, at the estimated cost of \$95,500.
 - Part A of this project (schematic design for HVAC replacement and conceptual plan for the elevator) has been completed.
 - Part B, now underway, calls for boiler replacement to begin in July and be completed by the end of October, 2018. An analysis of impact on the organ of elevator construction and operation will be completed.
 - Based on Impact Study findings and sufficient funding, Part C will be undertaken to install the elevator by the end of October, 2019.
 - d. Estimated cost for the boiler / air handler is \$387,000. The revised estimate for the elevator is \$320,000.
- 5. Two CCIT subcommittees are overseeing kitchen renovation and updates to audio-visual technology in Ryerson Fellowship Hall and the sanctuary.
 - a. McCreedy-Ruth Construction is serving as kitchen general contractor, Kitchens by Design as design consultant, and Rapids Wholesale Equipment as appliance consultant. It is anticipated that this project will be completed before the end of August, 2018. Estimated total cost for this renovation is \$100,000.

- b. Conference Technologies, Inc., is design consultant for
 - technology involving sanctuary audio and a video camera system (for enhanced live streaming of services), narthex audio and video messaging, and a fixed projector and large retractable screen in Ryerson Fellowship Hall, estimated to cost \$84,000. Because of concerns related to the completion of elevator planning, this project has been largely placed on hold. However, installation of the projector and screen (with protection from other construction) should be completed by July.

- 5. The Congregational Health Ministries Team is in the process of replacing additional pews with chairs matching those already in use. The cost for this will be approximately \$5,000, considerably less than the initial estimate of \$20,000.
- 7. A Mission Tithe of \$50,000 (and the additional \$50,000 pass-through donation) from the Wilson Family Foundation was contributed towards construction of the Pasrur Boys' School. An initial Mission Tithe donation of \$20,000 was directed to Iowa Valley Habitat for Humanity for the Interfaith Build in Hills, Iowa, dedicated in September. An estimated additional \$30,000 will be given to Habitat as donations continue to come in.

During 2017 and up to the present time, new pledges for the Capital Campaign were not solicited in order to keep the congregation focused on the needs of the FPC annual budget. Early this year, we were able to secure \$68,195 from endowment income to cover the administrative costs noted above in item #2.

At this point, an additional \$222,270 in pledges will be needed to fund all of our building projects. Within the next two weeks, the CCIT will reach out to new members and others who have yet to make a campaign pledge.

We rejoice that contributions have remained robust since the beginning of our Capital Campaign, which is to continue through 2019. Your prayers and new pledges of financial support for the successful completion of the campaign are most certainly needed and will be greatly appreciated. 


