Peace and Global Witness Special Offering

On October 7, we will celebrate World Communion Day by also receiving the Peace and World Witness special offering. This denominational offering is taken annually to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

Worldwide offering dollars have been used to fund the following programs:

- Work with young people transitioning out of prison or homelessness;
- Give funds to HIV education/prevention programs;
- Help fund educational assistance for veterans;
- Train peer counselors in peacebuilding in refugee camps in wartorn countries;
- Support programs aimed at ending human trafficking.

The largest share of the denominational offering supports the Presbyterian Office of Public Witness, the public policy information and advocacy office of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Its task is to advocate, and help the church to advocate, the social witness perspectives and policies of the Presbyterian General Assembly. Ministry in Washington, DC, offers a chance to translate the church's deep convictions about justice, peace and freedom from words into reality.


Here it is again: August in Iowa! Warm, humid days get punctuated by pop-up lightning storms. The plants get leggy, with flowers bleached out by sun. Personally, I have grown lazy, letting the weeds go until cooler weather allows for less strenuous removal. "The grass withers, the flower fades . . . yet the word of our God stands forever" (Isaiah 40:8). Responding to the word, we return from summer pursuits to take our place back at church or so it is hoped and praved!


Our denomination's General Assembly - a national meeting of elected teaching elders (pastors) and ruling elders — has been busy over the summer. It was the 223rd meeting of that body. Rather than voting to divest Presbyterian Church (USA) resources totally from companies relying on fossil fuels, the General Assembly voted to stay with a strategy of continuing prophetic engagement. It took up business related to battling sexual misconduct and abuse, as well as advocating for family leave. Violence in Palestine between Israelis and Palestinians caused the Assembly to call for both sides to take responsibility and make peace with justice. Capital punishment was condemned, concerns about gun violence were expressed, and the spotlight was put on Puerto Rico, race and the painful disparities being experienced by black girls and women in society. The General Assembly also did housekeeping: It approved a reorganization that will allow for more equitable balancing of decision-making and less infighting over resources-at least that is the hope.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "Letter from Birmingham Jail," a communication that called the white church of his era to walk the walk and not just talk the talk, is now under consideration for addition to our Book of Confessions. Its criticism of the church's silence and inaction in the face of racial injustice seems relevant for our time. As I have said on occasion, we need to distinguish boldly between the true church of Jesus Christ and current ideological streams that have twisted the cross into a symbol of racism, xenophobia and violence. This initiative may be a step in the right direction. It should at least generate conversation about religion and race in America.

General Assembly adopted a teaching document for Presbyterians to weigh regarding the times in which we live. Keep in mind that the General Assembly does not speak *for* the church but

rather to it. I share this with you for your own reflection, prayers and possible advocacy.

We are obligated to declare our concerns about the direction towards autocracy that our country is taking.

We say Yes to God's power of love and justice for the neighbor as well as the self, and we say No to demonic power that urges hate of the other, scatters blame, and creates civic discord.

We say Yes to our imperfect democracy with one person, one vote, and No to any corruption of our elections.

We say Yes to universal health care and No to care based on the ability to pay.

We say Yes to safe schools, houses of worship, and public gathering places; and No to civilian access to assault and/or military-style weapons.

We say Yes to core human values and No to dividing our humanity by ideology and partisanship.

We say Yes to bridges and preservation of families and No to walls.

We say Yes to affirming and celebrating the full spectra of human identity and No to discrimination and bigotry.

We say: "In life, and in death we belong to God."

(The 223rd General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) affirmed this declaration and offers it as a resource to congregations)

It is good to know where the 223rd General Assembly of the PC (USA) stands. Yet, where do you and I stand and what will we do about it?

Ah, autumn comes! Leaves falling, pumpkins carved, cider drunk, advocacy made, votes cast . . .

Your Legacy ...

It has been said that "your legacy is the indelible mark you leave behind when you make a difference in the life of another." In 2015, the First Presbyterian Church of Iowa City celebrated the 175th anniversary of its founding. Many past congregations have left us a legacy that has continued to help our church share Christ's message with the world. Among their many gifts to us is an endowment, which has been designed to support our ministry and ensure its outreach for years to come.

Some of you might ask, "What is an endowment?" An endowment is a portfolio of assets from gifts that are kept intact with only the income that is generated being used. To put it differently, the FPC Endowment is a permanent fund; the value of the original gifts (the corpus) is not spent. Only the income that is generated is used. The principal of these gifts is held in perpetuity with the investment income made available for ministries of the church. The FPC Endowment provides a way for persons to make gifts that provide for the long-term future of the church.

Our church encourages members to augment their Christian stewardship of annual giving by making both outright and planned gifts to benefit FPC. An endowment gift may be made at any time and is frequently made in honor or memory of an individual or as part of an estate plan. Types of gifts most frequently used for endowment are cash, bequests from wills and estates, marketable securities, stocks and bonds, tangible personal property, real estate, life insurance, charitable gift annuities, charitable trusts, life estates, and retirement plan designations.

Unless otherwise restricted by the donor, most estate gifts are placed in the unrestricted portion of the permanent endowment.

All gifts with restrictions named by the donor will be used for the donor's named purpose. Donors wishing to designate a gift for a specific purpose are encouraged to discuss the restriction with a member of the Endowment and Memorial Committee or Pastor Sam to ensure that FPC can use the gift in accordance with the donor's

wishes.

The Presbyterian Foundation put it very well. "Endowment gifts are theological statements which demonstrate one's belief that we are never ultimately proprietors, owners, but only stewards, lifetime guardians entrusted by God to use wisely what God has placed in our hands. When an individual creates an endowment gift for the church during or beyond their lifetime, it declares to the present and future generations the importance of our faith and trust in God. We have each drawn water from the wells we have not dug; we have sat under shades trees we did not plant and we each have a wonderful opportunity to provide the means for the church to have a strong and empowering ministry for generations to come."

What will your legacy be? Creating a gift to benefit your church is a transforming experience, and a wonderful example of Christian stewardship.

WHY WE WELCOME LITTLE CHILDREN TO

WORSHIP... At the time of baptism, parents, godparents and the whole congregation promise to bring children to worship. Not to do so would be like sitting down to the family evening meal but excluding the kids. Sure their manners might be far from elegant, but we welcome them because they are part of the family. Being with family is how we learn to be family. Worship is no different. Young people giggle, they poke, they ask questions and they swing their legs because they are young children. Children learn about worship and how to participate by experience, by how they are welcomed into the community, by what they see big people doing.

WHAT IS WORSHIP? Worship is how we respond to God. When we gather in worship we all come together to encounter Christ, and we watch together for God's presence in Scripture, our own lives, and the world around us. When we worship God, we are reminded that we



belong to God's love, and we are empowered by the Spirit to participate with God in loving and healing the world.

HOW DO YOUNG CHILDREN LEARN TO WORSHIP?

- By being taught they have a place in the community of the church.
- By seeing, hearing, feeling, even smelling, the sanctuary as a place of welcome and worship.
- By being around other children in the worship space.
- By watching how their significant adults sing and make prayers and offerings.
- By sharing prayers, communion, and worship leadership alongside adults.
- By being given ways to watch for God's presence in their own lives and being encouraged to share where they notice God and how they participate in God's love.

ADULTS LEARN TO WORSHIP by "becoming like a child" (Mt. 18:3). Children notice, absorb and feel deeply. They respond freely. Children perceive God. Children learn to worship from adults, and adults learn to worship from children. Bringing a child to church can be frustrating. Their behavior can make it hard for parents and others to worship. Then again, many facets of parenting can be challenging. It's the rewards that make it all worthwhile. While we do not want our children to be disruptive or hamper the worship of others, all of us together need to be reminded that children are not the church of the future. They are the church of the present and are to be treasured as such. Children and adults alike are able to watch for God and participate in God's love and healing.

SUGGESTIONS FOR ADULTS WITH CHILDREN

When possible, arrive in time to find a good place to sit. Let them sit next to the aisle, near a work station or in the front pews. Even let them stand on the pew next to you so that they can see.

Tell them before they come in what will happen in worship. Show them the parts of the service where they have an active role, and the parts where we all listen or watch others quietly.

Take advantage of the worship supplies and materials available at the door when you arrive, and bring them to your seat. Return bags and supplies to their place when you leave.

Worship with your child, guiding her or him through the service so they can feel what it is like to worship together.

Worship at home through saying Table Grace together, or Bedtime Prayers, or even "God bless you." Ask your kids questions about how they noticed God's love in their day, and how they shared in it.

Remember that sometimes children just plain need to run around and play. That's why we provide a bright and safe Nursery space for your young child at any time during worship. Gather them back with you for Communion so they can experience God's blessing.

SUGGESTIONS FOR ADULTS WITHOUT CHILDREN

Be helpful to parents of small children by not making them feel awkward or unwanted.

Acknowledge children by smiling, or nodding in their direction, to show your appreciation of them. In fact, make a child's presence a part of your worship by inviting their family to sit next to you, praying for

them, taking an interest in them.

Make a special point of sharing the Peace of Christ with them when everyone else is greeting.

Find a young child before or after the service, make eye contact, introduce yourself, tell them you are glad to see them and will be looking for them next week. You might just be the reason that family returns.

Reflections from a Pastoral Counselor . . .

If one saw a neighbor in their garage using an electric drill on their tooth with a cavity or if a colleague came to work on a Monday morning with 2x4s held together by duct tape around a broken arm after fall off a ladder, one might think, why didn't you go to a dentist or a physician? Seeking an outside intervention under those

circumstances would be seen as a sign of wisdom to assist healing, not an indication of inadequacy.

Yet, when it comes to a "decayed thought" or a "broken feeling," we are often expected to solve them on our own. This double standard frequently leaves people suffering emotionally—needlessly and in isolation. Just as a dentist or doctor has knowledge/skills/training/ facilitative angle for a beneficial intervention, so, too, a mental health professional can offer expertise along with an objective perspective. The relief that can come from such an intervention is life-enhancing, not a reflection of deficiency.

Expecting ourselves to be totally self-sufficient is not only unrealistic but also can be detrimental.



August 2018 Session Highlights

Clerk of Session Pro-tem, Ann Grosscup

The session met August 21 in Coover Lounge at 7 p.m. Pastor Sam called the meeting to order and lit the Christ candle. Elder Ann Grosscup led us in devotions and prayer. Ann read "Passing the Baton – Equipping Emerging Leaders of Today and Tomorrow," an address given to church leaders by Tom Smith, Reformed Church of America synod president. The address spoke to the pain and privilege of passing church leadership from Baby Boomers to Millennials.

The July 8 baptism of Lucille Hamilton, daughter of Bradley and Jocelyn Hamilton, was noted, as was the June 30, 2018 birth of Sullivan Edward Johnston, son of Amy and Taylor Johnston. Mary Ann Pedde died July 6, 2018. Her funeral was held at FPC on July 12 and led by Pastor Sam Massey, with interment in the FPC Columbarium. Mary Roberts died July 17, 2018. Her funeral was held July 22 at Gay and Ciha, officiated by Pastor Paul Akin, with burial in Memorial Gardens. The death of Dwight Shaffer on July 22, 2018 was noted. His funeral was held at FPC on July 30, and officiated by Pastor Paul Akin.

FPC Treasurer Larry Bruner reported that pledges are coming in slowly and expenses remain stable. Moderator and Elder Dale Kraus will share a financial update with the congregation, reminding them to fulfill pledges, via the bulletin and the newsletter. A motion was approved to go ahead and transfer the \$20,000 (previously budgeted) from Endowment income to the general operating budget.

Minutes of the June 19, 2018 session meeting were approved. Session approved Dennis Pedde's request for Columbarium interment for himself and Mary Ann. Session approved, via email, the contract with Robert and Millie Youngquist to consult with Endowment.

A motion was approved to participate in the following fundraiser—Join Team FPC for the Walk to End Alzheimer's on Sunday, September 16. Signup in Ryerson Fellowship hall began August 26. FPC's team goal is to raise \$1,000. All money raised will go to Alzheimer's Association for research and to enhance care and support for all those affected by this disease. The walk will be held in Lower City Park.

Session approved the Dodekah Program, which is in development, to be incorporated into the long-range plan for the sake of creating potential travel plans, promoting the program, researching various fundraising sources, and other logistics. The trip is tentatively planned for 2020, pending raising the anticipated needed funds, estimated currently to be up to \$70,000. Session will need to pre-approve specific fundraising events. Elder Carol Ulch, REALM Planning co-chair, gave an update on the 2019 planning and preparation for the stewardship campaign. Carol and co-chair Jeremy Fletcher are looking at the Garden Project as a project for the entire church with specific plans and congregation communication to come. Pastor Paul Akin will be working on a brochure to inform the congregation of the ministries' exciting program plans for 2019 and years beyond. Pastor Sam expressed appreciation to both Carol and Jeremy for their hours of planning work.

Presbyterian Education Board of Pakistan's Veda Gill is scheduled to preach at FPC on Sunday, March 31, 2019.

Elder Nancy Gardner gave an overview of Administration and Personnel Ministry's stewardship budget request.

Elder and Finance moderator's Dale Kraus encouraged ministries to dream big as he noted our great staff and sees a bright future for FPC.

Elder and Building and Grounds' moderator Vern Dengler reported the old boiler has been removed and three new boilers were to arrive later in the week. Installation is expected to be finished by October 2018. The kitchen remodel is underway and is to be finished by September 15, 2018. Sanctuary chairs were expected to arrive August 22, 2018.

Elder Nancy Gardner updated Session on Johnson County Interfaith Cluster. She shared a graph showing the social injustice themes that were the results of FPC one-on-one interviews. This information will be shared with the congregation and JCIC. FPC Core Team leaders are training other churches in conducting one-on-one interviews. Pastor Sam commended Nancy, Bob Goodfellow and Barb Stanerson for their CIC leadership.

Anna Sheetz gave an update on VBX and the positive outcomes. The parents' group wants to continue to meet into the fall.

Leah Bergman updated Session on summer worship, thanking Pastor Paul Akin and Sherry Lohman for their work, both seen and behind the scenes. The Ministry Fair will be held September 16, 2018.

All were encouraged to check "My First Pres" which can be accessed via the FPC homepage. The front page of the current newsletter gives step-by-step instructions. Kudos to Tammy Schroeder for setting this up.

Elder Amy Fletcher closed the meeting with prayer. The next session meeting will be held September 18, 2018 at 7 p.m. in Coover Lounge.

A few notes from Ecumenical Towers: the residents of Ecumenical Towers were invited to join the Board of Directors the afternoon of August 16 for pie and ice cream. The apple, cherry and peach pies were purchased from Ila Miller of Kalona. Coffee and iced tea were served with the pie and ice cream. Thirty-six residents attended along with 6 Board members, who served the refreshments. Barb Smith, who is the Social Chair, distributed a questionnaire to the residents who attended. She collected the questionnaires and will write up a story based on the results of the questionnaire. There is an artist who lives at Ecumenical Towers. She has paintings for sale, some of which are on display at the Lasansky Corporation Gallery. She offered to sell to the Board a couple of paintings at half price. One large and one smaller painting were purchased by the Board to hang in the lobby of Ecumenical Towers. The residents have access to a hair salon, deliveries from Table to Table, blood pressure clinics, deliveries from Grinnell Farms (CSA), and one-on-one tech support. In addition, the Crisis Center has selected Ecumenical Towers as a mobile food pantry site once a month. I have tried to give you a picture of the life at Ecumenical Towers. I hope I have succeeded! DVD's Wanted


November 3, there's a group going from our Church to visit the Pasrur Christian Girls School in Pakistan. We will be having some special time with the girls in the boarding house.


