





The Communion of Saints—Sunday, November 4

Who are the saints of the church? That is the question we will explore this **All Saints' Sunday, Nov. 4.** Though we especially remember those saints who are no longer with us on earth on this day, we are also reminded that we are living saints—embodiments of Christ to and for one another—here and now. We all have unique gifts and talents to share with the world to enrich the lives of those around us and become saints to one another.

On All Saints' Sunday, we lift up the lives of those children of God who have died in the past year, giving thanks for their lives and faith. We remember their lives and those of other faithful believers who have been examples of what we are called to be and do. During a time of

Dear sisters and brothers of First Presbyterian Church,

The peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all! I write on a beautiful day of sun, clouds, flowers and butterflies. It is basset hound weather! The church's kitchen and boiler renovation continues uninterrupted. While I am aware of a wider world of hurricanes and stormy politics, I feel gratitude to God for the day, our congregation's leadership and our opportunities for love and service. Life is good.

In a few weeks and yet two weeks prior to you receiving this newsletter, we celebrate World Communion Sunday. The event first arose from the ashes of the Second World War. The church of Jesus Christ, perhaps shattered by its inability to prevent two world wars as well as the excesses that led to the Great Depression, rededicated itself to the peace of Christ and Jesus' vision of the Realm of God. We have one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Parent of us all. While acknowledging our differences, we gather at one table of the Lord, sharing in God's bountiful mercy as broken sinners.

The same commitment to work diligently toward a new world reflective of the love of God, one less prone to the global annihilation of God's creation, resulted in the creation of the United Nations (UN). Presbyterian political leaders, as well as other Christians, shared in its birthing. No wonder that, even after 70 years, we hear echoed the vision of God in the flesh in the very human organization originally tasked to bring to the world both peace and justice. We may recognize that for some people, the easy equation of the UN's vision with the Realm of God may sound as if I am twisting the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the world's standards or endorsing all UN

actions. Not at all: I recognize that the UN falls far short of its own vision. Yet I contend that if the UN's vision were fully realized, it would look uncannily like the Garden of Eden. This truth is the deepest reality of our confession that Jesus Christ is Lord of All. At our human best, we see God's ultimate intentions for us.

Elder Ed Cranston recently commented to me how our own expression of the Realm of God reminded him of the visionary goals of the UN. I conclude with what Ed shared with me and Reconciliation Ministry that he helps to lead.

- Host public events like the annual Night of 1000 Dinners and Celebrating the World's Children
- Support Iowa City students who attend the Iowa High School Model United Nations
- Raise funds for refugee relief
- Advocate for U.S. leadership in the UN
- Build support for these 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals



I recently joined the Iowa United Nations Association as a board member and feel these 17 sustainable development goals align with our own emphasis here at First Pres. Church. Ed Cranston, Iowa United Nations Association board member






Want to itemize your tax deductions in 2018? Pre-pay your 2019 pledge before 12/31/2018 and you may exceed your standard deduction and receive extra tax benefits for your generosity. The congregation benefits and so do you! The standard deduction in 2018 for Married Filing Jointly is \$24,000; for Head of Household it is \$18,000; and for a single person, it is \$12,000.

Did you know that some persons will be doubling their anticipated pledge this year? By doing so, the contribution that they make helps them exceed the standard deduction. Next year they can take the standard deduction. They will then alternate that pattern in subsequent years. In this way, the taxpayer itemizes in one year and takes the standard deduction in the following year. The congregation benefits and so do you!

Also, If you are 70½ years old, you are required to begin taking a minimum distribution from your IRA, 403b or 401k. You can reduce the tax burden on that income and satisfy the Internal Revenue Code by transferring the required minimum distribution directly to the church. The congregation benefits and so do you!



First's Women Evolving

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? (James 2:14-16)

For many years
Presbyterian Women
(PW) at First Church has
been guided by this
notion of "good works."
Thousands of dollars have
been donated to mission
projects and local social
service agencies. These
funds come from church
lunches, the cookie walk,
the book sale, pledges
from individual women in
Eve and Martha Circles,
funeral receptions and

various smaller fundraising projects. In the last 2 years funds have been donated to the Take Away Hunger Iowa project; the Domestic Violence Intervention Program of Iowa City; the Mayor's Youth Empowerment Program; the Iowa City Free Lunch Program; First Church's Free Lunch team; the Bird House Hospice Home; Operation Backpack; the Common Fund of the Consultation of Religious Communites; Systems Unlimited; Four Oaks; Shelter House; and the mission budget of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Worldwide.

For many years the various groups and projects that fall under the umbrella of the Presbyterian Women (PW) of First Church have been led by the PW Coordinating Team. The group has sponsored social functions, Bible studies, and eastern lowa PW gatherings, but the primary responsibility of the team has been to administer and disburse the funds raised throughout the year. The Coordinating Team has been searching for new members and officers for the past couple of years — an effort which has so far

been unsuccessful. Thus, it has become necessary to "edit" the role of the leadership team down to this primary function of managing funds. The team has made the decision to cease pledging to the PW of the Presbytery of Eastern lowa in order to redirect all pledge funds to local service agencies. The team will be meeting only occasionally as needed to make decisions regarding disbursing funds. We encourage input from the women of the church in this endeavor since the funds come from the dedication and efforts of these women. Martha and Eve Circles will continue to collect the Birthday, Thank and Least Coin offerings administered by the national Presbyterian Women's organization. The Coordinating Team will ensure that these special offerings are directed appropriately. All activities with willing leaders will continue.

Finally this "editing" has led us to update the PW name — opting instead for *First's Women*. Please take a look at our new bulletin board at the back of Ryerson Fellowship Hall near the door. We encourage all of the women of the church to consider joining one of our many activities and to help us to continue to do our "good works." Or better yet, create a new group or activity that could raise funds for service agencies. A walking group? A cooking group? A biking group?

Reflections from a Pastoral Counselor ...

In the movie THE HORSE WHISPERER, Grace experiences a very serious accident while riding her horse, Pilgrim. Annie, Grace's mother, learns that there is this fellow, Tom Booker, who works with horses in a different manner. It's as if he whispers to them—and Annie decides she wants to utilize Tom for healing.

Tom's style is to offer an invitation to try to establish a relationship by communicating care and respect in the hope of creating trust. Because it is a duet, not a solo, a relationship requires a dual decision, a mutual commitment. And either party is free to withdraw.

Such an approach parallels God's style. While God wants to be in relationship with humanity, it is presented as an invitation—which includes the freedom to drop out—and is never forced upon us. With any relationship, if we choose to drop out, it is important to ask what will the benefit/cost be of not continuing. Maybe God is the People Whispere. . .

September 2018 Session Highlights

Clerk of Session, Nancy Weber

The session met September 18, 2018 in Coover Lounge at 7:00 p.m. Pastor Sam called the meeting to order and lit the Christ candle. Elder Cathe Franz led us in devotions and prayer. Cathe read a selection from the devotion site D365 that urges us to remember, when life can feel overwhelming, that God interrupts our lives to remind us of Him, and that we can, through our actions, reveal to others the love of God.

The August 26, 2018 passing of Carol Macon was noted. Her memorial service at FPC on September 17, 2018 was led by Pastor Sam.

Treasurer Larry Bruner reported that after contacting some of the folks whose pledges have lagged, he predicts they will get back on track. Elder Ed Cranston commented that it was good to see the Finance reminder in the bulletin.

Minutes of the August 21, 2018 session meeting were approved.

Elder and REALM Planning's Carol Ulch spoke about the Garden Project concept. A brief discussion followed. The following motions from REALM Planning were approved: 1) The Garden Concept, which was offered by the Equipping Ministry and discussed informally at the August 21, 2018 session meeting, for the purpose of creating a Church-wide activity to support the garden theme expressed in the Bible and to recognize the unique gift of Iowa's agrarian resources and culture. In support, 2) REALM Planning will be appointed as the general project manager for the Garden Project. It is understood that the Garden Project will be designed and managed to integrate all appropriate Ministries and other groups of FPC interested in the project. It is further understood that Staff will be responsible for project activities

in their assigned areas, and that a number of volunteers will be recruited to participate in all areas. And finally, 3) REALM Planning will convene a Task Force from the interested parties to serve as an advisory committee during the design and implementation of the project. It is understood that this design and implementation will include learning, worship, and outreach experiences for the FPC community as well as the lowa community external to FPC.

Session approved the hiring of Layne Sheetz for three months beginning October 1, using endowment income, to fill the .25 FTE position of Assistant to Minister of Equipping Programs for Youth, Young Adults, and Hospitality. Permanent employment through the budget is contingent on the 2019 budget.

In June, Session approved to open our church building, if the necessity arises, to post-ICE raid gatherings for the sake of providing immigrant families access to educational resources that will allow them to return to their homes equipped and empowered to provide for their incarcerated loved ones and themselves.

REALM Planning's Jeremy Fletcher distributed copies of "2019 Budget Request Summary," the first installment of the plans gathered from the ministries. This will be revised and revisited in the next month. Appreciation was expressed by all for Jeremy and Carol's hard work!

Elder and Finance moderator Dale Kraus relayed a question about the kiosk. Does it need a sign next to it explaining that a portion of a donation goes to fees? There had been a sign there at one time, but it appears to have been removed. Finance is OK with leaving it down. Elder Richard Van

Rheeden planned to check if, when making a donation, the kiosk already alerts donors to the possibility of adding a small amount to cover the fees.

Navigating Charitable Giving with The New Tax Code

As you probably know, the "Tax Cuts and Jobs Act" (effective as of January 1, 2018) has left many charitable donors rethinking their tax planning strategies. The standard deduction has nearly doubled – meaning that fewer people will be itemizing on their 2018 tax returns. However, there is good news for taxpayers who want to donate to our First Presbyterian Church Endowment while maintaining important tax benefits. Some strategies to consider are:

Establishing a Non-Endowed Donor Advised Gift Fund. Establishing this type of account allows donors to "bundle" charitable gifts for multiple years within one tax year. This would allow a donor to itemize their tax deductions in that "bundle" year. In subsequent years the donor would make charitable gifts from that account and would file their taxes using the standard deduction. Only non-profit organizations could receive funds from this type of an account.

Donating appreciated securities. The stock market has been doing very well and you may be holding stocks that have appreciated considerably since you purchased them. In the new Tax Act, the capital gains rates have not changed; therefore, cashing in such stocks can result in large capital gains taxes—possibly raising your tax bracket. By donating these stocks directly to one of the church's endowed funds, you can avoid capital gains taxes and receive the value of those stocks as a charitable contribution.

Making a distribution from your IRA (Individual Retirement Account). While you may no longer benefit from a tax standpoint from your charitable contributions if you do not itemize, you can still, in effect, get a deduction by contributing a portion of your IRA to charity. A Charitable IRA Rollover allows donors to direct up to \$100,000 per year per IRA owner from their traditional IRA to charity, tax-free. This gift option is open to donors age 70½ and older who have a traditional IRA, and it counts toward your required minimum distribution. This distribution should be transferred directly to the church – not cashed in and then given to the church. Donating directly to the church will exempt you from related taxes.

Of course, the most important reason to donate to our church endowment is to help yield perpetual support to our church's ministry and give thanks for God's guidance in our lives.

Reflections on Ministry in Crucial Times

What makes people generous? I have known people born in poverty, and they have given away a great deal. I have known others born with silver spoons in their mouths, yet they resent the few crumbs they are called on to share. How do we explain it?

I will note that gratitude, unless constantly renewed, is a short-lived emotion. Left to their own devices, people—in the blink of an eye—move from gratitude to God to one of prideful boasting in their own accomplishments and their worthiness to have what they greedily grasp.



In the church of Jesus Christ, we may oversimplify motivations for generosity. If you have the Spirit of God in your life, you generously give away your time, energy, possessions and money. Experiencing directly the love of God in your heart, you love.

Naturally, we don't judge the mitigating circumstances in people's lives that determine their giving, yet we know them by their fruit. The bottom line typically is that people are generous or they aren't. People either give away a high proportion of what they have **right now** . . . or they don't.


Some of us give because we can't help it: It feels really good to give God joy. Others of us feel that good stewardship means that we know how the money is to be spent, and why, before we ever give it. Put another way, we need to be well-informed in order to be generous. Sometimes this can lead to "the paralysis of analysis."

Yet when the desire for more information leads to increased generosity, it is a double-blessing: The recipient receives both a deep sense of appreciation from the donor AND the money.

It is in this spirit that I am communicating with you.

This year's stewardship campaign is a big deal, a probable game changer, however it turns out. We are praying that God will inspire our people to be generous and will inspire those already generous to be even more so. We are praying for a blessing from the Spirit of God. We are hoping and praying that our people will see the value of what we are doing and then, through pledging and giving, give us their "amen!"

To promote generosity, I share with you that our core value in 2018 is almost 2000 years old: It is Jesus' call for us to seek first the Realm of God and its right relationships of justice, mercy and faith. In the same part of Scripture, Jesus says that you and I need to choose between serving wealth and serving God. Jesus knows that generosity creates community, and greed destroys it.



To honor Jesus' call we must confront the demographic realities we face nationally and at First Presbyterian Church. The aging of our members has left us without the many tremendous workers and givers we have had to support the church's work in prior generations. In the course of human events, no demographic challenge is




permanent. These times of shortage will pass. Nevertheless, in the short run—specifically, in the course of my ministry and beginning this year—we will have to make some decisions that acknowledge that "we're not in Kansas anymore."

If it is any comfort, we are not alone in this conundrum, although I hope we are more conscious of it. The Southern Baptists are also losing members. Mega-churches are not only disconnecting from younger generations of members; too many of them are also reinforcing the selfishness and greed of the generations worshipping with them. By doing so, they exacerbate our broader social problems.

So what are we striving to do here at FPC?

First, relying on the generosity of our members, we are renovating the church for new generations coming with new expectations. I know that some of us just don't "get" why we need to renovate or add some new items to our building. I understand: Some days I can be a rusty, dusty antique too!

Second, some programs and missions are being replaced, or at least being revised, in light of generational change. [space] on Sunday mornings is one example. You will see intentional efforts to enrich our Sunday morning worship with practices that are appreciated by members of diverse generations.



that the mission field is no longer "over there" but rather "right here." This means our efforts are still devoted to charity and yet we are far more committed to befriend and serve the community. We join hands with people who are very different from us for the sake of the common good. This practice embodies the Realm of God in ways that money alone never can.

Third and finally, our 2019 budget strives to bridge this time of generational transition.







We continue our investment in energetic staff members who—in turn—invest in our congregation's people by empowering, equipping and encouraging them; and

We invest more heavily in programs of reconciliation (mission and justice), equipping and worship that invite us to experience personal transformation. Then we go out and transform our world.


Please be generous this coming year in your pledging and giving. During this critical campaign, we could sure use your financial "amen." Even your "attaboy!" would be pretty terrific.


