### Dear Church,

I'm writing to you freshly back from England, where we spent a lovely time with Beth's family, my brother, and some old friends. It was good to have the opportunity to be away and reflect on life here and the patterns of life that we will continue to form together as our ministry grows into the future.

I arrived back from England just in time to make it to the last two nights of the our Vacation Bible Experience. Even in my jet-lagged state that accompanied jumping 6 time zones and a 4-hour drive from O'Hare, I saw the great fun our youth



were having as the team Anna had assembled led them in games (Mark Beerends and Alex Voss), built up crafts reminding us of Jesus's story (Meg Dehner), learned songs about Jesus (Kyle Coleman and Sarah Beerends), and learned to interact with those stories (Nancy Gardner, Leann Graves, Perry Ross, Margaret MacInnis, Jen Adams, Perry Ross, Emmanuel Bonsu, and Layne Sheetz). My family joined Rhonda Barr, Mary Ellen Stamp, the Session, Stephanie Stamp, and Sharon Raffensperger in the kitchen to give both the youth and the leadership team a good meal to kick things off. As we did the dishes and wiped down the tables, it gave us the chance to reflect on all the opportunities interacting with the younger members of our church family give us. Every time I speak with one of our junior high students about God, I come away with a different perspective than my own, and am challenged to think about God in ways different than the ones I grew up with. Every time I sit down to visit with one of our elementary school members, I learn something new about their lives and their family that gives me a new point of connection with them, as I continue my own journey of building a life in this new lowa City, so different from the one I left in 1996.

I like to think of the Bible as the story of God and God's People; very rarely do we encounter truly individual stories in it. Some of you may immediately respond, "what of Jonah, sitting in the belly of a fish?" Even there, Jonah's great sin was avoiding God's instruction to go and save a city (which he later compounded by being angry at God for saving it). If there is a consistent theme, from the beginning of creation through to Jesus's resurrection and the miracles of the early church, it is that God is found in community. So I was thrilled to be a part of our FPC family as we spent an intensive week immersed in VBX. And I leave it with a challenge: if you weren't able to be a part of it this year, whether in planning, teaching, cooking, cleaning, setting up, or bringing in some of the amazing 370 pounds of gifts of food, diapers, laundry detergent, and menstrual items, find a way to join us next year. Come to learn as so many of us learned, and be inspired to see God with the eyes of a child once more. Or, even better, join us during our program year, beginning September 10. Every week gives us new opportunities to build connections with younger generations.

### **Elders Answer the Question of Why They Give To FPC**

I've written quite a bit over the last several months about determining your "Why" for pledging to FPC. In the beginning, I covered the importance of knowing the church's mission statement. That part about "living lives of justice, mercy, and faith" along with being "empowered by the Holy Spirit" and "sharing the word of God" can make for some pretty deep thinking.

Along with knowing the mission statement and what we at FPC are all about, I provided a framework called the 5 Whys for you to discover the true reason you give to the church. Essentially, you start with a general statement about why you give and answer the statement with, Why is this important to me? You conduct this response and question of Why? for a total of five times. Once that fifth Why? is answered, the real reason you give becomes apparent. What people usually discover is an event or response that really connected them to the church. If you haven't tried the 5 Whys, give it a go; you may be surprised where this takes you.


Session members will be sharing their Whys with you in this and upcoming newsletters. This month, we're hearing from Elders Jane Cranston and Jen Adams.

Chitoka Webb sent us greetings from California, and appreciation for her monetary gift from her FPC family.



### Simple Ways to Give

One of the simplest ways to leave a gift to First Presbyterian Church is to use the beneficiary designation on savings and retirement accounts, as well as life insurance policies. These can be done with no cost, and typically only require one to sign a new beneficiary designation form.

Retirement assets and similar accounts are called Income in Respect of a Decedent (IRD) assets. This is taxable income that's earned during life, but not received before death, so it is never included in an income tax return. These may be assets in Individual Retirement Accounts or 403(b) plans, accrued interest on Certificates of Deposit and savings bonds, nonqualified stock options, deferred payments of capital gains, or other income that is earned, but not acquired.

Naming the church as the beneficiary of these assets gives the estate and heirs the best tax benefits, since it avoids both income and estate taxes.

Life insurance that is no longer needed also can be an excellent gift, too. Naming the church as a primary or contingent beneficiary of an existing or new life insurance policy will result in a federal estate tax deduction for the full amount of the proceeds payable to the church regardless of policy size.

Because individual situations vary, be sure to consult your financial and tax advisors, as well as Bob and Millie Youngquist (319-653-4673) or Pastor Nathan Willard (319-351-2660).

The Presbyterian Education Board (PEB) are celebrating the 25th Anniversary of the Denationalization of their schools in Pakistan. I was asked by Veda to write an article about the denationalization from the perspective of First Presbyterian Church, Iowa City.

### The Denationalization of Presbyterian Education Board Schools and a Partnership with First Presbyterian Church of Iowa City

In 1999, our minister, Rev. Tom Finley Brown, called to ask if Ed and I could host a guest from Pakistan for a week. I said we would be glad to, never realizing it would lead to a lifetime of purposeful adventure. Veda Javaid Gill was traveling as part of an exchange program sponsored by PC USA (Presbyterian Church of the United States of America). The goal was to have Presbyterians from all over the world get to know each other and make meaningful connections. When Veda arrived, we felt an instant rapport. She was a wonderful addition to our family. Veda and I became fast friends and have been close ever since.

In 1972, the private Presbyterian schools in Pakistan had been taken away from the Presbyterian Church there and given to the government to become public schools. The process was called "nationalizing" the schools. Veda carried a stack of pictures showing what had happened to them while under the government's care. The buildings looked as if they had been bombed. The roofs had collapsed. The windows were gone. Everything was dusty and full of debris. Even the schools' furniture was missing or destroyed. Through neglect and mismanagement, the buildings were now ruined and unsafe. It was in this state of total disrepair, that the buildings have been returned to the Pakistani Presbyterians. PEB was thrilled to have them back, but also overwhelmed. In Pakistan, Christians are a persecuted minority, and they did not have funds to rebuild the schools.

Veda met with many groups of people at our church and shared the story of Pakistan and the denationalization of the PEB schools. Later that year, Elaine Markuson, a member of FPC, went to Pakistan to help and came back full of enthusiasm. When Rev. Ed Morgan arrived, as our new pastor, he was a true advocate for the PEB schools and for Veda's mission of goodwill. After Rev. Morgan retired, he became the Executive Director of Friends of PEB. He guided many trips to Pakistan and was instrumental in creating the Friends of PEB as a nonprofit organization. His leadership, vision, and hard work were a godsend to the PEB.

Over the years that followed, First Presbyterian Church of Iowa City, has sponsored a number of buildings at

the Pasrur Christian Girls School including the Multipurpose Hall, the Science and Computer Center, the Pasrur Boardinghouse, and a two-story classroom block. FPC was also invested in the construction of the Gill-Nicholson Boys School. In 2007, the FPC Mission Committee established the Friends of Pasrur, dedicated to finding scholarships for impoverished Christian girls to attend the Pasrur Christian Girls Boardinghouse. We have sponsored full scholarships for 100 girls at this boardinghouse each year since then.

Since our first visit from Veda Gill, back in 1999, our Over the years that followed, First Presbyterian Church church has given millions of dollars for brick-and-

mortar buildings and scholarships for impoverished Christian girls. We, however, are the real beneficiaries of this partnership. We have had the great satisfaction of helping deserving, young people to get the advantage of an education. We have watched our students grow and flourish with pride. We have grown together as a congregation and experienced the sense of grace that comes from giving to others. The Pasrur mission has been a wonderful asset for our church, and we have been blessed by it.

Veda has been our constant friend, our inspiration, and our trusted partner since we hosted her in 1999. She has visited our church every year (except during the pandemic) and escorted four trips for FPC

members to Pasrur, Pakistan. Veda is our guide in terms of supporting the PEB schools, always seeing that all details are managed and agreements maintained. Working across cultures and languages can be a challenge, and we could not have done it without Veda's constant and conscientious support.

Veda has preached many sermons in our church and brought us spiritual inspiration. Her life itself is an inspiration, and her faith is powerful and contagious. When someone has a personal tragedy, Veda provides meaningful support and love to help them through their difficult times. I know that this has been a meaningful experience for me. The force of Veda's spirit, her vision, and her faith have made the denationalization of

Presbyterian schools a true story of success and an act of inspiring faith.
