



The gifts of Christmas and Epiphany set an example for Christians today.




Thistime








Report on Gifts for Parents

After a two-year absence, the Consultation of Religious Communities *Gifts for Parents* returned to St. Mark's United Methodist Church on Saturday, December 3. This event provided children, 4–14 years old, with the opportunity to select a free gift for three important adults in their lives. Information about the event was shared through the lowa City Community District Student/Family advocates and local neighborhood centers. Families could pick up a color-coded time-specific admission ticket at the CommUnity (formerly the Crisis Center) food bank during the prior two weeks.





A wide range of wonderful gifts were donated by local faith communities and organizations. Items were received, sorted and organized by volunteers on December 1 and 2. Families were admitted at their assigned time (or later), and each child was welcomed by an adult escort who assisted them in making gift selections. Each gift was wrapped and labeled with the name of the intended recipient. Families had the opportunity to enjoy a pancake and turkey sausage breakfast provided by the St. Mark's Men's Group. Thank you FPC members, for your many wonderful gift donations and volunteer hours!

Although 131 families had secured reservation tickets, only 59 families attended the event. Nevertheless, 186 children experienced the joy of selecting gifts for others and all of the families appreciated our hospitality during this holiday season. Gifts not selected were shared with the following non-profit organizations: Crowded Closet, Domestic Violence Intervention Program, Goodwill, Open Heartland, Salvation Army, and Shelter House.

Kyle is a conductor, pianist, organist, educator, and composer/ arranger. He is a recent graduate of the University of Iowa (Master of Arts), where he studied Choral Conducting and Pedagogy. Born and raised in Gadsden, AL, Kyle began studying music at the age of seven and has not stopped since. He has worked as a church musician since the age of 14 when he accquired his first job as pianist at Oak Bowery Baptist Church in Ohatchee, AL. He earned a Bachelor of Music degree in Piano Performance and Pedagogy (2017) in Rome, GA, where he worked as a staff accompanist and church musician. In his senior year of college, Kyle met the love of his life, Abigail Marie, a costume designer, whom he married in 2016. They moved to Iowa City together in 2020 to begin their respective graduate degrees.

Kyle's musical experience spans a variety of styles and traditions, having performed as a soloist, accompanist, collaborative artist, guest conductor, and in ensembles across the southeastern United States, and more recently lowa's CRANDIC region. He teaches private piano lessons, has written and arranged commissioned works for various occasions, and has guest

conducted choirs and theater pit orchestras at the professional, collegiate, and community levels.

Kyle's hobbies include a love of coffee, composing music, reading and writing as much as possible, closely following college football, and improv comedy. He is thrilled to join in the good things happening at FPC and invest in this community.



Thoughts on the FPC Endowment

One of the greatest joys of the Endowment Committee is to review applications for worthy projects and to be able to support them financially. This past year, we held an application cycle in Spring and awarded \$25,250 in grants to members of our church's staff, the Kindness Campaign, the Enikahole Ministries in Cedar Rapids, FPC's Dodekah trip and the Domestic Violence Intervention Building Campaign in lowa City.

It should be noted that our committee is working to establish a somewhat regular application period that will remain at a standard time each year on everyone's calendar. Not only does this help those who need to prepare applications for our funding, but this also helps our committee to better weigh incoming requests and seek to maintain a balance of grants between church, local and international missions with the funds that are available to us. We work to utilize our funding as wisely as possible.

The funding we distribute comes to us once a year, usually in January or February. We are only allowed, per FPC policy, to take a distribution of up to 5% of our holdings in any given year. Once we have distributed these funds each year we must wait until the following year for additional funding to arrive. For this reason, random grant requests we receive outside this period cannot be considered unless we have additional funding available.

We frequently receive more requests than we can cover financially. However, there is one major way we can remedy this situation: increase the size of the endowment fund that we draw upon. Simply put, we encourage your giving to this fund. Not all giving has to be through an estate plan or after a death. It is also possible to give appreciated stocks and bonds as well as IRA rollovers. One could give life insurance policies that are no longer needed. Real estate is always transferrable. Outright monetary gifts are also welcome. Our newsletter columns and church bulletins have been full of illustrations as to how you might give to support our endowment — and you don't have to be wealthy to give to the endowment. All levels of giving are deeply welcomed. We would be happy to visit with you about any of these possibilities. As usual, we suggest that you should work with your financial advisor when making any large financial gifts.

Consider this an invitation to "pay it forward." What is your vision for the future of our church? What kind of needs could be met, or people served now or in 10, 20, even 50 years? You can help make that vision a reality with a gift to our endowment.

Session Meeting Highlights

The Session met Tuesday, November 15, 2022 at 7 p.m. in Coover Lounge at FPC. Pastor Frosty Krummel called the meeting to order, declared a quorum, and offered the opening prayer.

Minutes of the October 18, 2022 stated Session meeting, the October 30,2022 Congregational meeting to elect new officers, and the November 13, 2022 Congregational meeting to elect Rev. Dr. Nathan Willard as FPC's new pastor were approved.

Administration committee's Jeff Orris presented the following motion: "The Administration committee asks Session to approve their recommendation to allow the current contract agreement with Orbit Business Technologies to expire as of January 31, 2023, and immediately begin a non-binding, non-contractual business relationship with Digital Stew Services, Inc to start purchasing equipment and transitioning network access to provide FPC with IT security and support needs going forward." The motion was approved.

A motion to distribute Personnel Committee's letter to the congregation concerning staffing changes was approved.

An update on the current status of the Stewardship campaign was given; as of November 15, 2022 it totaled \$309.189.

Concerning the Alternative Energy task force plan proposal, Elder John Barr reported that four members of the Reconciliation committee have volunteered to be on the task force. A motion to form the task force consisting

of John Barr, Jane Cranston, Perry Ross, and Becky Ross, with the Ross's serving as comoderators was approved.

Elder David Van Dusseldorp reported that Endowment had \$7,600 in grant money yet to be dispersed.

Session members who attended the recent Sunday dinner with youth had good things to say about the chance for interaction between adults and the youth.

Finance Committee moved that Session request the full amount of \$36,178.28 from the church's Endowment fund to address shortfalls in the 2022 budget. The motion was approved.

Elder Barr shared information on the upcoming Consultation of Religious Communities meeting, where a vote would be taken on whether or not to dissolve the CRC oranizztion.

New Session members will be joining the December 2022 stated Session meeting.

Jim Claypool will serve as Clerk of Session beginning January 2023.

The death of Earl Warren Nelson, on November 11, 2022 was noted.

Closing prayer was offered by Jeremy Fletcher.

Next Session meeting will be December 20, 2022, in FPC Coover Lounge.

Flood Relief for Pasrur School Families

This year the Pasrur Christian School was affected by the flooding in Pakistan. It did not occur in the first wave of floods, but when the levees broke, the boarding house girls' families were underwater. This left the already impoverished Christian families in a dire situation. They did not have enough food to feed their families. Once again, people rallied to help them. Through private donations, and a donation from FPC's Reconciliation Ministry, \$11, 375 was raised to provide food and medical supplies for the families until the water drained and they could replant their crops.
