Dear sisters and brothers of and First Presbyterian Church,

I sit in my office on Monday, November 26, the day after a joyful reunion free of intrusion will snow. I confess that no matter how much I prefer spring and summer or even fall, the first snow of winter always thrills me. Autumn's undone work is now obscured by a blanket of white. The last bugs get the message that hibernation is their only option. Shoveling is tedious, yet the sense of accomplishment that comes with it is seldom matched. We creep toward solstice, and while snowcapped browns sway artistically in crisp winds, the bedecked evergreens speak to my Germanic primordial roots:

To Winter

(English Translation)

Welcome, dear Winter! Welcome here to the land! How rich you are, playing with pearls, as though they were sand!

You've sprinkled the yard, The garden paths with them; On the tree branches They line up by the thousands.

Your breath, dear winter Is colder, but healthy; Only keep a tight rein on storms, Or else it's too much!

(Elisabeth Kulmann, 1808–1825)

The Saturday of Thanksgiving weekend, however, I met the news of snow with two minds. First, I gleefully read the weather report and envisioned the beauty that soon would arrive. The prospect of it interfering with my normal routine aggravated me a bit, yet nothing could dampen my enthusiasm, except . . .

I experienced a distinct downside to the approach of snow. Susan, Will and his fiancée Yana had come home to join DJ and me for Thanksgiving, an event that I had been anticipating excitedly since July. For a brief time, I forsook reading, writing, thinking and exercise just to hang out with family. Saturday night would allow us to finish our tournament of Sequence and feast on my famous scalloped oysters. Sunday morning would find us all in the pew together worshipping, a rare treat for me.

The forecast suddenly changed all our plans. Susan, Will and Yana quickly packed their bags and vehicles. They left unceremoniously (north or west) to beat any possible blizzard. Suddenly I stood on the porch, the permanently vine-wrapped Christmas lights glowing above, waving at receding taillights in the deep darkness: bummer. I was in a Hallmark movie gone wrong. This was not what I envisioned for the conclusion of a joyful holiday of family bonding. It felt more than disappointing.

Chances are good our family will not be all together again without interruption at Christmas or at Easter. Such a

certainly not occur at the wedding in May. Indeed, for now, I cannot foresee a future when such a glad



reunion will happen again. So I am waiting, in hope, for that which I can imagine and yet cannot now see. I will be telling myself, "If it seems slow, wait for it." It is, after all, Advent. It is the time to wait. The season fits my fitful mood.

For me, Advent is not the slow crawl toward an orgy of self-pity marked by a sad absence. Yet, it is also not about family. It is not about gifts or Christmas services. Frankly, it is not even about the birth of Jesus that happened so long ago.

Rather, Advent is about waiting for deliverance, for the surprising arrival of God in a special way that was exemplified by the birth of Jesus and is now fully expressed in his resurrection from the dead. We wait, without always knowing its content, for a miracle. An author for the Alban Institute shares this thought with us:

A little more than a year ago, on Oct. 8, 2016, darkness and floodwaters overwhelmed 5,000 households in Robeson Country, North Carolina, and many thousands more across the southeastern United States. After inflicting catastrophic damage in Haiti as a strong Category 4 storm, Hurricane Matthew fell upon us, wreaking havoc, shattering order, breaking hearts, creating chaos. That is what disasters do. When overshadowed by disaster, we pray, we engage, we give, we work together to restore. That is what we do. And as we do these things, we embody the petition in Psalm 80:7, the appointed lesson for the first Sunday in Advent: Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved.

Gary Locklear of Pembroke, North Carolina, remembers Oct. 8 in his beloved community. He remained in the damp darkness for three days. Then resolution welled up: it was time to go out into the ravaged community around his home. A church and community worker and a home missioner for the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, he has been a consistent, leading voice in recovery efforts from that moment. In his life and leadership, we see the psalm prayed, lived, fulfilled: Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved.

In this season of Advent, as in so many others, we stand once again amid the destruction left by devastating storms. It has been an especially hard year for millions of people in Houston and Florida and throughout the Caribbean. Memories abound of disaster and aftermath following hurricanes Harvey and Irma and Maria. As Advent begins, the persistent darkness in Puerto Rico —

Seemingly oppositional, darkness and light abide very near one another: Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved. spite of a natural order that increasingly strikes against of misuse of it. Advent reminds us that God does not always do as we anticipate, yet God always does what is most loving. God is capable of surprising us. This sudden presence of God occurs is in

spite of a natural order that increasingly strikes against our free misuse of it. It arrives despite our inability to love neighbors as ourselves. In the throes of the bleak midwinter, still we wait on a response from God, sometimes knowing that our only option is to wait and pray because much is outside of our control. At other times we recognize that through our initiative we can embody the action that others are waiting for God to take: to lift a burden, to dry a tear, to advocate for

a hurting person, to console someone in prison, to write a generous check.

I am not a victim. I am an Advent Christian who realizes that while departing tailights mark the closing of one part of life, God will still surprise me with a greater light, in the future. Thanks be to God! And Merry Christmas! And Happy New Year!





2018 Winter Clothing Drive & Distribution

The Consultation of Religious Communities (CRC) conducted a successful annual Winter Clothing Drive and Distribution on October 11-13 at three sites in Johnson County under the leadership of Pastor Carolyn Otis, Community of Christ Church, Coralville. The Iowa City site, hosted at The Kingdom Center on Southgate Ave distributed 500 winter coats on the 13th: the Coralville site at Community of Christ Church also distributed 500 coats; and the site at the North Liberty Community Pantry distributed 400 coats. Each recipient of a coat could also select five other winter clothing or footwear items, plus a hat, scarf, gloves or mittens.

First Presbyterian Church was aligned with the lowa City site.

Onsite donations were received from KCRG TV 1 — Coats for Kids, Shelter House, six faith communities (First Presbyterian, Christ the King, Faith United Methodist, First United Methodist, St. Andrew Presbyterian, and St. Wenceslaus), the Aktion Club / Reach for Your Potential of Kiwanis International, and four community families. The number of donating faith communities was down from prior years. All but four bags of assorted winter clothing items were gone by noon on the 13th, and these were picked


up by Shelter House. Unfortunately, a large quantity of non-winter clothing and shoes were received (i.e. twenty 33gallon bags worth) and

donated by us to Crowded Closet.

Capital Campaign Implementation Committee (CCIT)

November 2018 Report to Members

The CCIT last met at on 10/30/18 in Coover Lounge with John Barr, Larry Bruner, Vern Dengler, Amy Fletcher, Tammy Foster, Dale Kraus, Lee Tippe, & Judy Whitford participating

The following business was discussed and actions taken: A. Updates on completion of:

- 1. Kitchen project John reported that, except for installing a backsplash behind the stove and a shade valence, renovation of the kitchen has been completed. On 10/26 key kitchen users received formal instruction in the use and maintenance of dishwasher by a Hobart technician. John Barr and Tammy Schroeder will summarize key information for users of the dishwasher by mid-week. Under the supervision of Anna & Layne Sheetz, the Youth Group will use the dishwasher for their dinner on 11/1. Judy Whitford advocated for the formation of a committee to oversee kitchen operations. John Barr, and Tammy Foster are working on a concise instruction manual for kitchen appliances (including a maintenance schedule) and operations. Rebates will be applied for relative to the refrigerator, freezer, dishwasher and diode panel ceiling lights.
- Boiler / air handler project Lee Tippe and Vern Dengler reported that the boiler, air handler and all additional room controls should be fully operational by Thanksgiving. B&G Committee has recommended and is acting on overseeing the cleaning of some obstructed ductwork.
- B. Financial status of the campaign: Per the "Campaign Improvements October 2018" provided by Saira Steen. John Barr reviewed the current pledge total, income, actual and projected expenses, and status of rebates. The following items were specifically discussed:
- The "Total Project" column, "Contributions" line: The \$1,145,725 is the total pledged to date. "Endowment Income" (\$68,195.19) had been approved by Session to cover the Administration Expenses.
- 2. The "Actual Project to Date" column focuses on
 - a. operational income (actual monies received to date: \$972,304.62). This includes \$99,832 donated specifically for the kitchen project.
 - b. operational expenses; two corrections were required:
 - (1) The Kitchen Remodeling expenses noted in the attachment (\$77,723.17) reflect expenses paid by FPC for appliances, cabinets / counter tops, and to some contractors. Not noted is an additional payment due to our General Contractor of \$31,119 (which include a range of their expenses, the building permit, payments to subcontractors, etc.) and approximately \$1,170 that will further be spent for a tile back splash and shade valance. This will bring our total project expenses to \$110,092 (with funding of

\$99,832). John Barr proposed, and it was seconded, that the resulting \$10,260 deficit from this project be covered with the excess \$14,910 from the Sanctuary Seating Project. This motion was approved unanimously.


- (2) The Boiler Replacement expenses noted in the attachment (\$143,768.51), do not included our most recent payment of \$57,000 to the Winger (billed on 10/11/18) or change order #7, approved for \$20,550 on 10/16/18. Our current estimate for completion of the boiler project is \$235,342. We had initially proposed that this project would cost \$400,000. Further, a rebate of approximately \$3,000 is anticipated on this project, based on preliminary feedback on our rebate application.
- Elevator project The current estimate for this project is \$320,000. We had initially proposed that this project would cost \$250,000. On 4/16/18, our design firm (Walker, Coen, Lorentzen) formally presented the Organ Impact Report which outlined steps to be taken to protect the organ during elevator construction and ongoing operation. Lee Tippe moved, and it was seconded, that FPC proceed with Part C (Elevator construction documents / Bids / Construction Administration) of the contract signed with WCL 2/27/18. This motion was approved unanimously.

4. Remaining projects:

- a. Technology It was originally anticipated that a total of \$80,000 would be needed for improvements in Ryerson Fellowship Hall and Sanctuary. Thus far, \$11,737.80 has been spent for the screen and projector in Ryerson Fellowship Hall. The Conference Technologies Inc. proposal we've most recently been considering calls for an additional \$80,000 to bring these projects to completion.
- b. Mission approximately \$30,000 needs to be contributed to Iowa Valley Habitat for Humanity in 2019 to complete our Mission Tithe.

Addenda — Since our meeting on 10/30/18, it was determined that:

- 1. Dishes / utensils coming out of the dishwasher are not adequately dry, necessitating towel drying. It has been recommended by the manufacturer (Hobart) that a rinse agent dispenser be added to our system. EMS Detergent Service, N. Liberty (which services the dishwasher at Free Lunch), will be installing the dispenser (which can also dispense soap, if we decide to add this in the future) for \$400; rinse agent is \$25 per gallon, which will last for approximately 1,000 loads.
- 2. On 11/9/18, Lee Tippe adjusted the TOTAL boiler replacement cost (construction, design & construction phase services) to \$274,342.

November 2018 Session Highlights

The session met November 20, 2018 in dates. The Congregational Health Coover Lounge at 7:00 p.m. Pastor Sam called the meeting to order and lit the Christ candle. Elder Michelle Bessman led us in devotions. She spoke of the fact that a lot of fear exists in the world today. How, as Christians, do we respond to fear and violence? God urges us not to be afraid, to practice love.

The death of Ruth Gier, on 10-15-2018, was noted, as was the death of Joye McKusick, on 11-14-2018. Pastor Sam led the service for Joye on 11-25-2018 at the Ned Ashton House.

Deacons-elect and elders-elect Steph Paulson, Tony Warren, Sarah Klemuk, Brian Kleis, Steve Smith, Pam Kautz, Nancy Ross, Bonnie Bender, and Leann Graves met with session members in small groups for the purpose of examination. A motion was approved to accept them and welcome them into service. Installation of the new officers is planned for January 13, 2019. After deacons-elect were dismissed, incoming elders Leann Graves, Tony Warren, and Steve Smith told session more about themselves.

Treasurer Larry Bruner reviewed the month's income and expense report. We are in good shape in terms of the income that has come in from pledges. A **motion to accept** the finance report was approved.

Session approved the minutes of the October 16, 2018 stated session meeting, minutes of the November 11, rain water collection method and to 2018 congregational meeting, minutes delegate to the FPC Green Team, of the November 18, 2018 special session meeting to welcome new members, and the 2019 communion

Ministry report was received, as were notes from the November 15, 2018 Presbytery of East Iowa meeting, held at St. Andrew Presbyterian in Iowa

A motion was approved to appoint the following persons as corporate officers:

President: Jeri Smith Vice-President: Dale Kraus Treasurer: Larry Bruner Clerk of Session: Ann Grosscup

A motion to permit the Free Lunch leadership to hold a congregational fundraiser to support the ministry, with time and date to be determined in conjunction with Session Ministries, was approved.

Session approved a motion to welcome the Rev. Dana Martin (father of member Travis Martin) to preach Nov. 25, 2018.

The motion to concur with Sadie May to use Burianek funds to fund staff members Tammy Foster, Tammy Schroeder and Saira Steen to attend the 2019 ACS conference was approved, with the cost at \$5,132. Elder Carol Ulch spoke briefly about calculating the coming budget and the organizational plan.

Reflections rom a Pastoral Counselor ...

Nothing gets our attention like our mortality, which can be something we ignore and/or take for granted when things are going well. When our capability to deny our human fragility is interrupted—either temporarily due to circumstances such as post-surgical restrictions, or even permanently due to an irreversible disability—we are left with an adjustment of varying magnitude. Sometimes it is terribly difficult to face our new reality.

The ultimate manifestation of our mortality, of course, is death. The November 7, 2018 edition of THE CHRISTIAN CENTURY has as its cover article, "Don't forget, you're going to die." Much of our lives is spent pushing away this disturbing thought.

The truth is, many of us are accustomed to being self-sufficient and hold that status as the standard to be maintained in order to

"live the good life." A colleague who is from a farm community was told at an early age: "Love many, trust few, paddle your own canoe." Yet it can be hard to paddle with a broken arm or dislocated shoulder, or an occurrence that is even more serious.

Learning to accept assistance from others graciously can benefit the giver as well as the recipient. Both givers and receivers are necessary to keep the process of life moving forward. As unwelcome as it may feel, being dependent on others is not a sign of inadequacy. Rather, to need assistance is an indication that we are human, a truth sometimes unwelcome yet still one to be embraced. This is because being human is okay, as was confirmed with God coming as the very human Jesus that we celebrate at Christmastime.


