#### Dear First Presbyterian sisters and brothers,

The grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you! Merry Christmas and Happy New Year in the very near future! Tell me: Are you headed home for the holidays? Or are you already there? During this season we find ourselves under tremendous pressure to identify our homes and go to them. The songs we sing of homecoming often reflect the cultural realities in which they were written.

Consider Bing Crosby's classic "I'll Be Home For Christmas:"

I'll be home for Christmas. You can plan on me Please have snow and mistletoe And presents on the tree Christmas Eve will find me Where the love light gleams I'll be home for Christmas If only in my dreams I'll be home for Christmas You can plan on me Please have snow and mistletoe And presents on the tree Christmas Eve'll find me Where the love light gleams I'll be home for Christmas If only in my dreams.

It was made popular by the geographic distance between American G.I.'s fighting in the Second World War and their families. Or consider the offering made by Perry Como:

Oh, there's no place like home for the holidays 'Cause no matter how far away you roam When you pine for the sunshine of a friendly gaze For the holidays you can't beat home sweet home! I met a man who lives in Tennessee, and he was headin' for Pennsylvania and some homemade pumpkin pie From Pennsylvania folks are travellin' Down to Dixie's sunny shore From Atlantic to Pacific Gee the traffic is terrific! Oh, there's no place like home for the holidays 'Cause no matter how far away you roam If you wanna to be happy in a million ways For the holidays you can't beat home sweet home!

This song reflected a post-war restless and consuming American public that soon would have interstates to travel, allowing them to return from burgeoning cities to their rural origins.

It has always been this way among us. The songs of colonial Williamsburg reflected the people's deep yearning to reinvent English customs in America so as to feel at home:

Now Christmas comes, 'tis fit that we, should feast and sing and merry be.

Keep open house, let fiddlers play

A fig for cold, sing care away.

—Virginia Almanac, eighteenth century

We, too, have yearnings for home, do we not? Yet you and I are not primarily Americans: As persons who follow Jesus Christ, the good old USA is our familiar address, not our home.

So where is home for people like us, Christians of sincere faith? German theologian Karl Barth offered this insight:

If we are quite clear about God's lordship and therefore His love on the one hand, and our own lovelessness and unworthiness of love on the other, it will strike us quite clearly that the autonomy of our existence has been taken from us. He has taken it to Himself; He has not taken away our existence from us. We have not ceased to be ourselves. We are still free. But in that existence He has left us without root or soil or country, 'having transferred us to the Kingdom of the Son of his love' (Col. 1.13), having Himself become our root and soil and country.

Barth adds that God's saving grace "frightens [Christians] away from themselves, deprives them of any root or soil or country in themselves, summons them to hold to the promise, to trust in Him, to boast in Him, to take guidance and counsel of Him and Him alone." Put simply, home is not something for which we search and to which we flee once finding it: Home has come looking for us and now has claimed us in the person of Jesus Christ. We are at home with him, among our siblings, parents, children, aunts, uncles, cousins and other kith and kin given to us by God, wherever we find ourselves. We serve as stewards of the earth, caring for it and not exploiting it. We and it belong to God, and in God we find our home.

So how do we explain the nostalgic longing generated by these songs of Christmas? The feelings they generate in us should guide us, yet not in some quixotic attempt to find a home out there, somewhere. Neither driving nor decorating nor a plethora of diversions that we pursue will quench the yearning. We can exhaust innumerable resources in the effort and still end up disappointed.

We can trust the feelings because they tell us to look for love, yet not in the wrong places. In the God who claims us in Jesus Christ we find the source of all love. To find God's love we need to come back to the beginning of our quest, at the root of our yearning, looking within and around us. In the here and now, in what and who is

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present, we discover love as fully as is humanly possible.

So this Christmas, go where you want to go, and yet understand that you are already at home, with God, wherever you stray. Here is a bit of concluding wisdom from no less than poet T.S. Eliot: "We shall not cease

from exploration, and the end of all our exploring will be to arrive where we started and know the place for the first time." See you later: Welcome home.

## FPC Public Declaration of Human Rights Support for Pro-Immigrant Policies

First Presbyterian Church, Iowa City (FPC), affirms the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) policy:

- Live out the Gospel call to love our neighbor and welcome the stranger;
- Reunite parents and children who have been separated as soon as possible;
- Advocate ending family detention;
- Offer visitation programs and ensure attorneys for detained immigrants;
- Advocate to stop the criminalization of immigrants.

FPC supports restoring the U.S. Government's humanitarian commitment to refugee resettlement.

## FPC chooses Welcome!

Background: Reconciliation Ministry provided education to the congregation on church sanctuary following worship April 14, 22, and 29, 2018. On April 29, 2018, attendees indicated their top five (5) choices to the question: *How should FPC respond to the immigration crisis?* Reconciliation Ministry presented the following motion to Session which was unanimously approved on June 19, 2018:

To approve First Presbyterian Church being a community of love, hospitality and fellowship by:

- Offering space at FPC for community education events;
- Financially supporting the Center for Worker Justice and the Eastern Iowa Bond Project;
- Providing tangible items and offering physical presence/help at other churches who are offering sanctuary to immigrants and their families;
- Providing public witness by both issuing a FPC public declaration of human rights support for proimmigrant policies as well as advocating for policies promoting immigration and human rights.

## A Joyful 2019 Gifts for Parents

Before that time, she had been in a public school where she was made to sit on the floor because she was Christian. No one was allowed to talk to her, and she wasn't allowed to drink water from a glass. She said, "This made me feel very lonely and neglected."

Once at the Pasrur Christian Girls School, Sumbal flourished. The yearly reports about her always said that she was excelling and, later, that she was "brilliant." Over the years, we received her thank-you notes, saw her drawings, and watched her transform from a little girl to a fine young woman. We kept Sumbal's picture in our kitchen as a reminder of the little girl that we were so happy to have as a part of our extended family and were sorry to hear that Sumbal moved away in 10th grade. Of course, we now have a new student.

Our Friends of Pasrur group recently undertook a project that we called a thank-a-thon. We tried to contact our donors by phone to thank them and to ask them for any feedback they might have for us.



## FPC Financial Status, November 24, 2019 by Finance Committee Moderator, Dale Kraus

I have a few brief comments I would like to share with you regarding the financial condition of our current 2019 budget. Based on our most recent Financial Report ending October 31, expenditures have exceeded income year to date by over \$47,000. **To be exact, a \$47,635.24 shortfall.** 

The shortfall is not because we are spending beyond our adopted budget. In fact we are within 1% of where we should be on expenditures.

Our financial deficit is because we are significantly behind in meeting our Pledges and General Contributions. As of the end of October, we are 83% through our 2019 Fiscal Year budget of \$622,000. However, our pledge income was only 74% of the amount pledged. That translates to mean that our pledge income is \$42,125 behind where it should be. General Contributions, meaning non-pledge giving, is \$16,618 short. Together they total a negative \$58,743 if we were to assume equal giving throughout the year. The one positive category on the income side of the ledger is Miscellaneous Income, which has exceeded our year-end projection. That is primarily due to the distribution we received from the Walker Trust, which was approximately \$20,000 more than we estimated due to a change in their corporate structure and the manner in which they determine their distributions.

We cannot continue our programs, pay our staff, maintain

our facilities and pay our utilities if income shortfalls continue! We adopt a budget based on **our pledges**, the history of non-pledge income and estimated income from other sources. If we do not receive this income in a timely manner, it adds an unnecessary burden on how we function. As a result, the Finance Committee has advised the Session and various committees to refrain from all non-critical expenditures. While we are contacting those who are behind in their pledged giving, we also know a few of these folks or their families may be unable to fulfill their pledges for various personal reasons.

We have a wonderful church family. As moved by the Holy Spirit, we make a difference to not only those who take part in the services and programs we offer; but also, we make a difference to our local community and to the world at large. Together, with God's guidance, we make good things happen! We hear a lot about how good our economy is. Our church, its

programs and people are also very good. We need to turn these blessing into an appropriate expression of generosity. Please help us get our financial health back to where it should be. If you are behind in your planned giving, now is the time to catch up. May God continue to bless each and every one of us.



## November 3, 2019 presentation to FPC



### Keeping the Faith by Pastor Sam

It is easy to get so caught up in the business of daily life that we lose sight of our greater goals. That is why some people of faith take a personal inventory of their faith and life from time to time. Approaching a new year seems a natural time to take stock, adjust our itinerary, if needed, and decide what shifts we will make in our life journey. Some identify a new spiritual discipline or practice as a new step in their relationship with God and people.

A basic resource for Presbyterians, besides The Bible, is the constitution of our denomination. Part I is the Book of Confessions. Part II is the Book of Order. In a section of the Book of Order titled "The Ministry of Members," we find one way of reviewing our faith journey and determining what course corrections may be needed. An introductory paragraph is followed by 12 ways of involving oneself in the life of a church and growing into evermore faithful discipleship:

"Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a joy and a privilege. It is also a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. A faithful member bears witness to God's love and grace and promises to be involved responsibly in the ministry of Christ's Church. Such involvement includes:

- Proclaiming the good news in word and deed,
- Taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- Lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- Studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,
- Supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,
- Demonstrating a new quality of life within and through

the church,

 Responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,

- Living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- Working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment,
- Caring for God's creation,
- Participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and
- Reviewing and evaluating regularly the integrity of one's membership, and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

This last suggestion brings us full circle to what's suggested in the first paragraph of this article. If we're honest with ourselves, it's not likely that any among us could compare our life to this list, and say, "I've got this. No need to invest in my faith journey any more than I do now. I'm doing all those things to the max."

A review like the one suggested in this article is not an exam to be graded. Rather, it can help one think about the "Big Picture" and how to fit into it. Some might identify an involvement they'd never thought about before and decide to try something new in that area. Others may see an involvement that they've been working on over the years and decide to step up a bit to greater involvement in that area.

This article is offered not as an assignment but as an invitation to keep growing in faith. Travel mercies as you journey on in your walk with God.

## November 2018 Session Highlights

Pastor Sam Massey called the meeting to order at 7 p.m., a quorum; was declared before the Christ candle was lit. Tony Warren offered the devotion, Native Americans' 7th-generation principle for decision-making, and led opening prayer.

Pastor Sam Massey reviewed the officer training components: faith conversation, doctrines, polity and constitution. Both Jane Cranston and Jeremy Fletcher shared their own views on the importance of this church in their lives and excitement for this new opportunity to serve.

Dale Kraus detailed the year-to-date financials, noting 2019 income is behind from both pledges and general contributions. Through Oct. 31, 2019, received pledges show a shortfall of \$42,128; estimated general contributions are at a \$16,619 shortfall.

The status of 2020 FPC pledge campaign was given by both Dale Kraus and Larry Bruner. Last year, 165 pledges for \$480,000 were received. To date for 2020, pledges totalling \$353,000 have been received.

#### **MOTIONS APPROVED:**

Funds in the Building & Grounds Reserve Fund account (~\$10,300) be transferred to the general fund to address part of Building & Grounds expenditures beyond their budget.

Finance Committee will articulate financial status to the congregation verbally, Sundays, Oct. 24, 2019 and December 15, 2019, plus in writing.

Richard Van Rheeden and Becky Ross, FPC members of the Mission and Social Justice Team of the PEIA, fill out the Local Church Mission and Social Justice Involvement, Partnership and Engagement Survey for session approval of survey content at December 19, 2019 meeting.

Extend the consultant contract, Jan. 1, 2020 – Dec. 30, 2020, with Bob and Millie Youngquist.

Support the FPC Public Declaration of Human Rights for Pro-immigrant Policies.

First Presbyterian Church, Iowa City, (FPC) affirms the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) policy:

- Live out the Gospel call to love our neighbor and welcome the stranger;
- Reunite parents and children that have been separated as soon as possible;

- Advocate ending family detention;
- Offer visitation programs and ensuring attorneys for detained immigrants
- Advocate to stop the criminalization of immigrants.

FPC supports restoring the U.S. Government's humanitarian commitment to refugee resettlement. FPC chooses welcome!

Concur with Endowment and Memorial Committee's endowment income disbursement recommendations of \$13,450. The Endowment Committee report on the following page provides more information..

Support Equipping and Worship & Arts Ministries hosting a rotating wall-hung display in the main level hallway (above the coat hooks). (To reflect the congregation's growing and future diversity in race, gender, sexual orientation and ethnic group, the pictures of the former pastors will be rotated with other pictures in the hallway. The former pastors' pictures, in between hallway rotations, will be hung in Pastor Sam's classroom as he relies on them to teach congregational history.)

Accept the General Contractor Agreement from McCreedy-Ruth Construction, LLC, for the construction of a three-level elevator, with Capital Campaign Implementation Task Force (CCIT) handling discovered details, at the estimated cost of \$399,755.

Further, in order to ensure that adequate funding is available for timely payments to the Contractor, Session authorizes that undesignated unrestricted income from earnings of the Endowment Fund be pledged to guarantee payment. The Endowment Fund will be reimbursed as Capital Campaign pledges are received.

Task Force updates were shared: New Creations Academy Advisory; Volunteer; Treasurer Position.

Michelle Bessman closed the meeting with prayer.

- tions, programs and missions to make this possible, if and as God calls us to make cuts;
- I pray that you will forgive Session if the hard choices that may have to be made impact you and vour family negatively:
- For this time and these issues like these God created you and has called you to First Presbyterian Church; and finally
- You alone will decide whether or not First Presbyterian is empowered to embody the realm of God and God's justice, mercy and faith: 2020 is in your and God's hands.

Please join me for prayer, one offered by a Presbyterian congregation in New Zealand and which reflects my own feeling:

Each of us is a fragile miracle, evidence of God's creative hands, and amazing grace.

We are each unique, unrepeatable gifts to the world.

## FPC Endowment Committee Awards Grant Funds to Seven Local and International Projects

News from Endowment Memorial Coordinators, Bob and Millie Youngquist

In the past year, the FPC Endowment and Memorial has awarded the following funds to worthy local and international projects.

\$8,000 to the Dodekah Project, helping to fund a trip to the Holy Land in the Summer of 2020 for 8 FPC members.

\$6,000 to the Gill-Nicholson Boys' School in Pasrur, Pakistan for furniture, computers, science equipment and a boundary wall.

\$4,150 to the ARC of SE Iowa in Iowa City for the purchase of a smart board, and furniture for the Bill Reagan Teen Space. The ARC provides daycare and teen programs for special needs individuals in the Iowa City area.

\$4,000 to Little Creations Academy for purchase of materials to create learning centers for the daycare center at the New Creations International Church in Iowa City. Most children attending this center are African-American and many are of Sudanese and Middle Eastern descent. All receive financial assistance from DHS.

\$1,200 for the Salvation Sandwich Program to purchase supplies for sack lunches on the 4th Sunday of the month for needy lowa City residents. The sandwiches are made by FPC church members and distributed by the Salvation Army.

\$2,000 for the Evangelical Global Pentecostal Church for the purchase of sound equipment, insurance and applications fees for 501c3 certification. This congregation meets in our sanctuary on Sunday afternoons and is working under the guidance of Sam Massey.

\$100 for Parents Night Out for the purchase of activity and craft materials. PNO is a ministry of FPC, providing a ministry to our local church and congregation of free childcare for one night a month.

We are honored to share these blessings that have been provided through our church endowment. We truly want to thank the many saints – both present and past – who have made our endowment possible.

Now, we have come to the end of another year. There might be others in our congregation who are considering donating to our endowment. If so, perhaps the following thoughts might be helpful to you as you finalize your finances for 2019.

Donating appreciated securities. The stock market has been doing very well and you may be holding stocks that have appreciated considerably since you purchased them. In the most recent Tax Act, the capital gains rates have not changed, therefore cashing in such stocks can result in large capital gains taxes -- possibly raising your tax bracket. By donating these stocks directly to one of the church's endowed funds, you can avoid capital gains taxes and receive the value of those stocks as a charitable contribution.

## Making a distribution from your IRA (Individual Retirement Account).

While you may no longer benefit from a tax standpoint from your charitable contributions if you do not itemize, you can still, in effect, get a deduction by contributing a portion of your IRA to charity. A Charitable IRA Rollover allows donors to direct up to \$100,000 per year per IRA owner from their traditional IRA to charity, tax-free. This gift option is open to donors age 70½ and older who have a traditional IRA, and it counts toward your required minimum distribution. This distribution should be transferred directly to the church —

not cashed in and then given to the church. Donating directly to the church will exempt you from related taxes

Of course, the most important reason to donate to our church endowment is to help yield perpetual support to our church's ministry and give thanks for God's guidance in our lives.


