

#### Dear sisters and brothers of First Presbyterian Church,

The grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you!

Tuesday morning: The University of Iowa is closed and the school system is shuttered for three days, a number of biblical proportions. In theory, I am not stranded: Yet having frequented the hospitals the last four days regularly, tending to our beloved in presence and prayer, I have plenty to do at home on a cold day. My duties include responding to the inevitable return of the newsletter due date.

My thoughts drift to the old Myth Busters program and one episode in particular when they dealt with the concept of cabin fever. Having attempted to cross-country ski (falling four times) and walking across icy parking lots, I can see why people choose to remain intramural. The Myth Buster gang proved that cabin fever is real – you can get sick when trapped indoors by the weather - and I anticipate the next three days with a sense of wonder. When not writing, I pray for those who must be outside, listen to the dog snore and relish the thought that the ravages wrought by the Japanese beetle population may be restrained this year by the killing cold.

In the bleak mid-winter – "cold, on cold, on cold" – we gallop toward Lent beginning in early March. If all goes according to plan, Ash Wednesday will find Susan and me celebrating our 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary in a warmer clime. Easter will fall in April, undoubtedly with showers that summon forth May flowers (and a wedding) and perhaps some flooding with them. We celebrate the Resurrection, then the cycle begins again and life returns.

Contemplative Richard Rohr speaks of the necessity of embracing the two halves of our life, as if they are two seasons to be embraced. Both are necessary for spiritual maturity, he contends. In the first half of life, we build reputations, careers, families and wealth. We pursue the normal aspirations of our species, driven as we are by the amygdala and organized by the prefrontal cortex. Rohr notes that for the vast majority of people, this is all there is: They end their days having lived only half a life. They exhaust their years conventionally and die measuring their Your pastor, Sam brief existence along a spectrum from losing to winning, their place on it based on comparisons to equally conventional (make that very boring) people. Even a dark or lighter shade of gray stands out when all else is homogenized into a monotonous, monochromatic mousy.

Some people, however, get disrupted. They suffer some sort of loss that opens the door to the second half of life. The window gets broken and can't be shut. An earthquake rolls the stone away from the tomb. Like Dorothy going from Kansas to the Technicolor of Oz, light and rainbow hues emerge from the vortex of trite and a yellow brick road winds to the horizon. Rohr frames this opportunity crisis as the hero's journey. He points to such figures as Ulysses in Homer's Odyssey, Abraham and Sarah leaving



Ur, Buddha seeking enlightenment, and Jesus turning away from the family business to become a prophet. The gods - our God - invites some to leave behind all those conventions that comfort most people, leaving the dead to bury their own dead, and strike out in a new direction, in a God-led adventure of epic proportions. Not all can leave home in their bodies to accomplish this opportunity to explore, yet physical condition need not be a barrier: heart, mind, prayers and resources can travel far from a keyboard, wheelchair and sick bed. Indeed, wheel chair and sick bed in particular can be the impetus to engage the second half of life when the door shuts on the first half, when it lies in shambles or just gets boring. "You come too," God says, taking our hand and pulling us gently through the true barriers we have erected in our dullness.

Three days in sub-human cold, with wind-bent trees, warn against too many trips outdoors. This, too, is a disruption, life getting in the way of living. With Japanese beetles, perhaps some part of us dies too. Winter's hiatus can be wasted or it can bear a message. What aspect of the first half of our lives gets frozen off? What new dimension will emerge, exposed by howling wind or gentle rains combined with warming temperatures? Wait upon the Lord, and watch.




## Prayer Center Open beginning March 10



## January 2019 Session Highlights

Clerk of Session, Ann Grosscup

The January 2019 in-person stated meeting was cancelled due to expected bad weather. Elders approved not meeting in person and conducting January business by email voting. Written reports were submitted by the following ministries: Administration and Personnel, Equipping, Reconciliation, Support's Finance Committee, Board of Deacons plus Pastor Sam to provide decision-making information to facilitate all elders' email vote.

Session's preparation materials noted that the 2018
Annual Report will be shared by month's end
electronically and in paper copy. Officer ordination and
installation occurred Sunday, January 13, 2019, as did a
volunteer recognition reception. Earline Moll's memorial
service was held at FPC, with Pastor Sam officiating, on
December 31, 2018.

By e-vote, the following motions were approved:

- Minutes of December 18, 2018 stated session meeting.
- Hold the Congregational Meeting immediately following worship, Sunday, February 3, 2019.
- The youth will host a lunch fundraiser to benefit the mission trip transportation costs immediately prior to the Congregational Meeting, Sunday, February 3, 2019.
- The youth's Chili Cook-off fundraiser, also to help defray mission trip costs, will be Sunday, May 5, 2019.
- Stated session meeting of Tuesday, April 16, 2019, for necessary session business (probably 8 p.m.–9 p.m.), will immediately follow 6 p.m. dinner with and examination of the 2018–2019 Confirmand class.
- Session will be notified of the Free Lunch fundraiser when the date is set. (The Free Lunch fundraiser was session approved November 20, 2018.)

- Receive end of year Income and Expense and General Fund balance sheet reports as amended and presented.
- That from the Capital Campaign's "Mission Tithe" aligned with Iowa Valley Habitat for Humanity (IVHFH), \$20,000 be immediately directed to their Interfaith Build and \$5,000 to the Women's Build (honoring Doris Preucil).
- Accept JJ DeRyke's generous offer of a larger water collection tank and incorporate it into our rain water utilization plan.
- On behalf of First's Women (previous known as Presbyterian Women), have a 6-month Cookie of the Month Club. (Monies raised would purchase materials needed to continue making the mastectomy pillows, port pillows and novelty surgical caps for UI Stead's Family Children's Hospital surgical patients.)
- The nursery hours change from beginning at 9 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. The nursery will be closed during non-Sunday morning special services, with the exception of the Easter Vigil service.
- Return of \$20,000 to the Endowment Projects Fund account due to the positive income balance for yearend 2018 budget.
- An amount not to exceed \$5,000 from the 2018
  year-end balance as a one-time bonus to staff (other
  than the Pastor) as determined by the A & P
  Committee, with any approved amount less than
  \$5,000 being deposited in the Cumulative Reserve
  Account.

Next session meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, February 19, 2019, 7 p.m., in Coover Lounge. Nancy Gardner will share opening devotions; Amy Fletcher will lead closing prayer.




# Knox College Choir Concert Wednesday, March 13 7:30 p.m.

# Peace and Global Witness Offering supported Jeff and Christi Boyd's PCUSA Ministry in the Congo

In the last FPC newsletter, information was shared about the PCUSA Congo Ministry of Jeff and Christi. Unfortunately, the following local tie-in was omitted.

The Peace and Global Witness Offering's local church portion was forwarded to Jeff and Christi Boyd, PC(USA) missionaries serving in the Congo. The offering recipient was determined by Reconciliation Ministry to support the families and friends of Congolese members and friends remaining in the Congo.

The Boyds joined FPC and HJPC Guiding Board members in Iowa City the summer of 2017 for dinner at FPC. We learned of their new ministry, Healing Hearts, to address the generational trauma experienced due to the area's violence.

FPC forwarded \$178, which will give an early boost for the funds needed in order to hold the second-level Healing Hearts training in the Kasai regions of the Congo.

Please refer to the December–January FPC newsletter to learn more about the Healing Hearts program, requested by mothers to help their children deal with routine trauma.

#### Plastic Pollution Is a Real Problem

Most people know that plastic is a problem by now. If not then Google plastic pollution and you will find more information than you can read.

I'm not going to go into all the details of plastic pollution, but since Iowa City Recycling no longer takes plastic bags at their drop off centers I am going to give you a list of things you can do to avoid some of the plastic you acquire.

- Shop from the produce section first use mesh produce bags https://www.amazon.com/Earthwise-Reusable-Mesh-Produce-Bags/dp/B005E2QRPG
- 2. Look for items in glass jars rather than plastic jars
- 3. Go to the meat counter instead of buying prepackaged meat and ask that they don't use plastic
- 4. Buy bars of soap rather than liquid soap in plastic bottles
- 5. Take your own reusable containers for leftovers when eating out
- 6. When ordering a drink at a restaurant tell the waiter you don't need a straw
- 7. Take reusable cloth bags with you when shopping
- 8. Bring your own reusable drink container and stop buying bottled water
- 9. Use your own reusable coffee cup
- Shop in bulk take your own jars or reusable containers

It's nearly impossible to avoid all plastic, so recycle any stretchy plastic that sneaks into your house at a local grocery store. Most have a bin as you enter the store. Things that can be included are bread wrappers, saran wrap, newspaper bags and other stretchy packaging. Sometimes you get gigantic plastic bags when ordering something online – use those as garbage bags or for storage.

Start out by choosing a couple of these ideas to tackle, and when you've changed your habits pick a couple more. Please check all other single-use plastic packaging for the triangle that tells you it's recyclable. If the triangle symbol has numbers 1-5 or 7 it is recyclable at the curb.

Since FPC has remodeled our kitchen and we have a new

efficient dishwasher, we are using much less single-use paper and plastic. This will save us money and we will have lots less trash going to the landfill.

## Planning Your Charitable Giving

Often in this column we will close by asking you to contact us if you have any questions about the FPC Endowment. Though we are always ready to answer your questions, another very good place to start is by consulting one or more of your professional advisors. Sometimes an advisor will ask you about charitable giving, but often an advisor will take the lead from your questions.

Of course, to take advantage of professional advice about tax-wise ways to give, people must first be interested in making charitable gifts. They must be charitably inclined. Charitable inclination is merely a starting place, though, and all a person's or couple's primary charities, as well as their heirs, must be discussed and woven into the plan. This does not need to be done all at once, and many plans evolve over time.

Once heirs and charities are identified, the plan must consider all the assets available. When meeting with your estate-planning attorney, for example, have a written list of everything you own and your estimate of its value. The list should include:

- Cash
- Savings
- Your home
- Second home
- Vacation or other property
- Stocks and bonds
- Life Insurance owned by you or by others on your behalf
- Commercial Annuities
- Personal property (Cars, boats, collectibles, jewelry, artwork)
- Promissory Notes
- Business Interests
- Retirement accounts (IRA, Roth-IRA, TIAA-CREF, SEP, 403(b), 401(k))

With lists of what you have to give and who and what you wish to give it to, good planning can begin. As always, if you have questions about the FPC endowment, please contact us or another committee member.

What might my driving say about my maturity in my understanding of God? If I take seriously the biblical admonition "Love your neighbor as yourself," how might my compassion impact my driving? What's the relationship between love and making sure that my passengers, other drivers on the road and me stay safe?



Please join us for one of these Sundays to begin the discussion of end-of-life planning and how we can assist you in the process.



- 1. On Sunday mornings, the church will normally not close for inclement weather. Whoever from the staff is available to come and lead at least a brief prayer service at 10:30 a.m. will do so. As for events after worship on Sundays, when adverse weather is experienced please contact the event leader to see if the event is still scheduled. If weather grows extreme, check KCRG or call the church to hear if any message has been left giving scheduling information.
- 2. On days when the lowa City Public School System is in session, the cancellations or postponements announced by the school system by KCRG or other means apply also to the church.
- 3. If inclement weather arrives following the close of school on a weekday, please contact the event leader to see if the event is still scheduled. Check also KCRG and call the church to hear if any message has been left giving information.

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
