The Season of Lent begins February 26

Throughout this season of Lent, we will be using the ancient Japanese art of kintsugi as a metaphor for our faith and discipleship.

Kintsugi ("golden joinery"), also known as Kintsukuroi ("golden repair"), is the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery by mending the areas of breakage with lacquer dusted or mixed with powdered gold, silver, or platinum. As a philosophy, it treats breakage and repair as part of the history of an object, rather than something to disguise.

As humans beautifully created by God, we are broken sinners yet called by Christ to be disciples *because* of our brokenness. Broken and holy. Whole and broken.

Ash Wednesday, February 26 at 7:00 p.m. Worship in the round with imposition of ashes. We are all broken. We are all sinners. We are all holy.

Keeping the Faith

It is easy to get so caught up in the business of daily life that we lose sight of our greater goals. That is why some people of faith take a personal inventory of their faith and life from time to time. Approaching a new year seems a natural time to take stock, adjust our itinerary, if needed, and decide what shifts we will make in our life journey. Some identify a new spiritual discipline or practice as a new step in their relationship with God and people.

A basic resource for Presbyterians, besides The Bible, is the constitution of our denomination. Part I is the Book of Confessions. Part II is the Book of Order. In a section of the Book of Order titled "The Ministry of Members," we find one way of reviewing our faith journey and determining what course corrections may be needed. An introductory paragraph is followed by 12 ways of involving oneself in the life of a church and growing into

Dear sisters and brothers of First Presbyterian Church,

The grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you!

Our wonderful treasurer, Larry Bruner, is retiring. This is a sad fact that we will mark on Sunday, February 23, following worship. Larry took up his volunteer task with zeal, integrity and good humor. His will be a hard act to follow. When it appeared that we were on the cusp of financial ruin, he would say, "It will come in, no worries." Yet when it looked like we were flush, he would say, "Looks can be deceiving." He was like Joseph, Jacob's son, who assisted pharaoh by predicting accurately that fat and lean years would years follow one another: So it has always been.

Larry's steady hand, overseeing our financial secretary and advising all of us, will be sorely missed. Stay in church but go with God, Larry! Margaret, always faithful, send him back to us if he hangs out at home too much. We are missing him already!

This year proved to be a lean year for First Presbyterian Church. We were not alone, as many of my colleagues bemoaned shortfalls in church giving. Some of this lapse may be due to our loss of saints to the church triumphant, while other saints are no longer in charge of their own finances. We are grateful for what they have done. So it will be someday for each one of us! The new tax law passed a few years ago has also had impact. As I read about businesses like John Deere "right sizing," I am also cast back to the months just prior to the Great Recession of 2008. Perhaps we are hearing the first warning bell for more challenging times to come. Of course, for some of us, the times have never stopped being challenging.

One of the trend lines noticed by those of us in our congregation's leadership is that although only some of us are very aware of our budgeted giving, many more of our members are not. Yet this latter group is very aware of our special fundraisers and offerings.

In a year of restrained pledge giving overall by our members, Session is trying a daring experiment, one that needs our enthusiastic support. Specifically, while our pledged giving is going to continue to

 retain our talented staff at current levels with no salary increases (as ministry is a person-to-person way of operating, our staff folks are critically important to us, and we hope you will invite people

- to come to church from the new neighborhoods emerging around us to get to know all of us);
- pay for increased building costs; and
- support trimmed programs, yet ones that we believe can still benefit our church members enormously,

our mission giving has been trimmed to make room for monthly special offerings that we trust will encourage all of us to match and perhaps exceed what we have done for mission in prior years through our annual budget.

Each month our Reconciliation Ministry will present a different theme and options for our mission investment. In March Camp Wyoming will be featured, as you see below.

Please keep in mind that our annual budget still has mission giving in it to backstop partially those months when special giving falls short. Furthermore, our ability to do special offerings rests both on our continuing pledged giving to the church AND our "over and above" giving to mission causes.

Thanks for helping us try to move in this new direction! Your support is greatly appreciated. I look forward to your presence on February 23 in church to help us send Larry off to his next retirement gig with a big thank you!

Support Camp Wyoming Through FPC Special Offerings during the month of March

FPC's Reconciliation Ministry will be collecting special offerings each Sunday in March to support Camp Wyoming (CW), an outdoor Ministry of our Presbytery of East Iowa (PEI). These offerings will support two initiatives. First, we will be providing scholarships for children of racial / ethnic minority FPC families who have had no or very limited prior camping experience. Last year, these scholarships allowed five FPC-member children to attend a session of CW.

Second, we will contribute funds towards a \$125,000 anonymous matching grant to construct a high ropes course and climbing tower at CW. evermore faithful discipleship:

"Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a joy and a privilege. It is also a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. A faithful member bears witness to God's love and grace and promises to be involved responsibly in the ministry of Christ's Church. Such involvement includes:

- Proclaiming the good news in word and deed,
- Taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- Lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- Studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,
- Supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,
- Demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- Responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,
- Living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- Working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment,
- Caring for God's creation,
- Participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and
- Reviewing and evaluating regularly the integrity of one's membership, and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

This last suggestion brings us full circle to what's suggested in the first paragraph of this article. If we're honest with ourselves, it's not likely that any among us could compare our life to this list, and say, "I've got this. No need to invest in my faith journey any more than I do now. I'm doing all those things to the max."

A review like the one suggested in this article is not an exam to be graded. Rather, it can help one think about the "Big Picture" and how to fit into it. Some might identify an involvement they'd never thought about before and decide to try something new in that area. Others may see an involvement that they've been working on over the years and decide to step up a bit to greater involvement in that area.

This article is offered not as an assignment but as an invitation to keep growing in faith. Travel mercies as you journey on in your walk with God.

Operation Backpack Spreads its Wings

As you may know, the Operation Backpack team at FPC has been delivering nutritious bags of food to kids in need at Lucas Elementary since 2012. In 2019, the national program changed as did the local HACAP program. The changes require that all the packing of food be done at HACAP in Hiawatha. This change modifies the dynamic of our intergenerational team who had been meeting monthly for an hour at church to do all the packing and have fun conversation.

Rather than quit the program, we instead worked with some teachers and the PTO at Lucas to meet a quick, short-term need for the winter. In roughly 48 hours we raised several hundred dollars from personal donations, and

several team members used this or their own money to purchase coldweather items for elementary kids so they can all stay warm at recess and while walking to and from school. We donated approximately the following items to Lucas:

- 22 winter coats
- 17 pairs of snow pants
- 36 warm shirts/sweaters/sweatshirts
- 35 pairs of sweatpants or jeans
- 8 winter hats
- 12 pairs of gloves
- 4 pairs of socks
- 31 pairs of boys undies
- 67 pairs of girls undies

The staff at Lucas were EXTREMELY impressed with the quickness with which we were able to respond and get them what they needed. They love FPC! We don't yet know what the future holds for our work with the kids at Lucas, but if you are interested in donating financially or becoming involved with your time, please let Carol Kirsch or Lara Marsh know. 

If weather grows extreme, check KCRG or call the church to hear if any message has been left giving scheduling information.
- 2. **On days when the lowa City Public School System is in session,** the cancellations or postponements announced by the school system by KCRG or other means apply also to the church.
- 3. **If inclement weather arrives following the close of school on a weekday,** please contact the event leader to see if the event is still scheduled. Check also KCRG and call the church to hear if any message has been left giving information.



January 2020 Session Highlights, Submitted by Ann Grosscup, Clerk of Session

Session was called to order at 7 p.m.,
Tuesday, Jan. 21, 2020, when Pastor
Sam lit the Christ candle. Leadership
was the focus of a book of Proverbs
devotion and opening prayer shared by
Steve Smith.

The 2019 Fiscal Year ended (Dec 31, 2019) with a \$17,901.26 deficit. Annual income was \$594,117.33 while expenditures were \$612,018.59. The area going over budget remained Building and Grounds due to unanticipated expenses. The year-end deficit was reduced to \$7,579.04 by transferring \$10,322.22 from the Building and Grounds Reserve Account to the General Fund, thus depleting that reserve account as final 2019 expenditure were accordingly adjusted to \$601,696.37.

The 2019 Budget adopted by Session was \$622,000. 2019 pledge income was 92.9% of the amount pledged (\$479,100) while general contributions were 77.2% of the amount (\$70,000) estimated. Both of these sources of giving were below the recent historical average percentages of budgeted giving.

MOTIONS APPROVED:

- Session approves that the FPC name is used in pursuing the feasibility of faith-communities holding a wedding expo specifically for the LGBTQ community.
- December 2019 financials were received and approved.

- Minutes of stated session meeting Dec. 17, 2019.
- Communion schedule for 2020.
- Chitoka Webb's columbarium request.
- Kevin Cullum, director of Camp Wyoming, to provide a "Minute for Mission" on Sunday, Mar. 1, 2020, during the worship service.
- To defer decision. Session is sending the following the motion back to A&P to research, specifically with a CPA regarding the tax implications for both the employee and FPC: To recommend to Session to transfer unspent FSA funds of \$500 from FY 2018 and \$500 from FY 2019 (total of \$1,000) to the corresponding employee's Professional Development account funds for use in FY 2020.
- Session endorses REALM Planning to establish a task force to plan and execute a congregation-wide campaign to solicit ideas for large community service projects, develop those ideas into plans, and ask the congregation to select the project plan they wish to begin executing in 2021. - executing in 2021.
- Session approves a 2020 budget of \$592,422.

The Session approved a 2020 budget for \$592,422. This approval was based upon a 2020 budget recommendation by the Finance Cluster of \$588,822 plus a \$3,600 increase due to adjustments in various budget line items by Session. The approved 2020 budget is \$29,578 less than the 2019 Budget. The 2020 budget contains no increase in staff salary and reduced expenditures in most other budget line items. Discussion points were: asking A&P to review position descriptions for any duplication of duties; implementing monthly mission interpretation by providing the congregation information for financial support; and shift thinking from financially supporting other worthy projects toward implementing FPC projects building relationships and revenue.

Nancy Gardner, A&P convener, led the evaluation of Pastor Sam Massey's Terms of Call. Confidential positive comments were readily shared by elders. Nancy will share with Pastor Sam at a later date.

Nancy Gardner shared how well the Johnson County Interfaith Coalition (JCIC) Voter Engagement event was that FPC supported and the community attended. Fellow elders, Sharon Raffensperger and Leann Graves, were 2 of the FPC volunteers.

VEDA GILL BRINGS NEWS OF PASRUR





δώδεΚα (Dodekah) is a year-long Bible study and discipleship program at FPC that culminates in a two-week pilgrimage to the Holy Land in June.
