Greetings in Christ!

I'm excited to join First Presbyterian Church as your new pastor. It's been 30 months since I first drove by and started to wonder what it would look like to serve you, and 9 months since I made that interest official by sharing it with the PNC. It was with the sense of fulfilling the opening leg of a long journey that I started to unpack all of my books and figure out how to arrange my office last week. I hope to continue that journey by meeting with each of you individually, so that I can learn about your life, your story with FPC, and your hopes for the future. We'll work on having some signup sheets outside the sanctuary at future worship services, and you can always email, call, or text,

As you've undoubtedly heard by now, I bring with me 45 vears of familiarity with Iowa City: while I have not lived here full-time since 1996, there has not been a year that I haven't made multiple trips—in my youth, to the various familiar establishments of downtown Iowa City; as the parent of young children to pools, playgrounds, and libraries in Iowa City, Coralville, and North Liberty; as the parent of slightly-older children to sporting events, plays and musical events at Riverside Theater and Hancher Auditorium, and to the many new restaurants that continue to appear around the metro. Some of these visits were driven by my parents and siblings, and some by my spouse, Dr. Elizabeth Yale. Beth gamely gave up a tenure-track job at Western Carolina University to move to Ankeny in early 2014, and by the spring of 2017 had begun to commute to Iowa City twice a week as a lecturer in the History Department and Center for the Book. She also brings an unexpected historical connection; while she grew up in northern California, her late mother was born at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics and spent the first decade of her life here and in Waterloo, making our kids Martha (13) and Teddy (10) something like 5th-generation lowans, even though they were born in Boston and North Carolina.

While I bring some geographical and cultural familiarity with Iowa City, my denominational background is in the United Church of Christ; I grew up, was confirmed, and was ordained in The Congregational Church (UCC) downtown, our current partners in youth ministry. There are long cultural connections between the erstwhile Congregationalists and the Presbyterians—they were, broadly speaking, the southern and northern branches of the Reformed Christian movement in Great Britain. In much of the English-speaking world, the two movements

eventually merged into one denomination. While this did not happen in the United States, the two denominations have covenanted with one another to, among other things, allow ministers to serve congregations in either denomination when there is a good local fit. This does mean that, while I can make jokes about my Puritan ancestors for hours on end, I still have learning to do about

Presbyterian history, polity, and confessions (the UCC statement of faith is quite a bit shorter than even the PCUSA's Brief Statement of Faith). I'm very glad to have not only the support of a number of knowledgeable lifelong Presbyterians here, but also our ordination candidate Anna Sheetz, who, I gather, has had to pass some rigorous examinations on these very topics.

I look forward to learning more, both about your relationships with Presbyterianism and your relationships with FPC in the coming months. Tammy Foster and Tammy Schroeder have already been very helpful, but there are even more stories here than there are people, and I'd love to learn more about them.

Meanwhile, we find ourselves a week away from the beginning of Lent! Kyle Coleman and I have been working on the Ash Wednesday service, which will be held in the sanctuary at 7:00 p.m. on February 22. The music on

Sunday sounded wonderful, and I've felt privileged to have Kyle and Melissa as we all begin to think through what worship in FPC will sound and feel like in our new mutual ministry.

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Session Meeting Highlights of January 2023

The meeting was called to order with a short devotion and prayer by Bridge Pastor, Forrest Krummel at 7:00 p.m. in Coover Lounge.

The Report of the Treasurer, Ken Miller, was received.

The minutes of the last meeting of Session held 12/20/2022 were approved.

The minutes of the annual congregational meeting of the congregation held 01/15/2023 were approved with the following addition: The Treasurer reported that the budget presented in the annual report was approved by the Session.

The Session voted to create a Pastoral Support Team to assist the incoming newly called pastor for one year, the Team to consist of the former members of the Pastor Nominating Committee.

The Session voted to approve payment of the full tuition for the new pastor to take a Presbyterian Polity course through the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary.

The Session elected the following officers, if the way be clear after the current president of the corporation was consulted:

The Session elected Elder Steve Schomberg as the Commissioner to Presbytery, if the way be clear after Elder Lara Marsh consulted with him to be sure he is willing. Alternate Commissioner will be Jim Claypool.

Committee reports were received.

The Session approved reimbursement of expenses paid personally by members of the Personnel Committee upon submission of the appropriate vouchers requesting payment to the Manager of Finance and Purchasing, Krista Livingston, and to allow additional reimbursement of expenses for the year in the amount of up to \$1,500.

The Reconciliation Team is excited to have Jerald L. Schnoor speak about climate change after worship on Sunday, February 19, in Ryerson Hall.

Dr. Schnoor teaches Civil and Environmental Engineering, Occupational and Environmental Health. He is a Co-Director for Global and Regional Environmental Research.

He has testified several times before Congress on the importance of passing the Clean Air Act. We hope you can join us to hear

his important message.

A Stewardship Recap

Here we are, it's February 2023. So, how did we do with our recent stewardship campaign? In a word (or two) ... pretty well! Let's look at the facts:

- Overall number of pledges received: 106 out of 194.
- This represents 55% of our pledging units (individuals, couples, families).
- Total amount pledged so far: \$345,574.00.

Session was firm about adopting a budget using only pledged income and the previous history of cash contributions. With this information, the 2023 budget reflects those expenses we know we can afford. It's a

healthy budget that will allow for quality programming, upkeep of facilities, and important mission work. Could we increase the percent of



pledges received? Would this help us to do more? Could we affect more lives in and out of the church? Of course! But more importantly, let's celebrate the good work we are doing. We're delivering the good news, reaching people, in the church, in our community, and across the world. And that is truly a celebration to be proud of!




Deep & Wide Lent with Spiritual Disciplines

A continued Happy New Year everyone!

We hope that 2022 proved to be a great one for all of you and that 2023 is already finer still!

The FPC Endowment was able to serve important needs in 2022. This past year, \$74,278.27 was awarded to various projects through the Unrestricted portion of the endowment. This money provided \$36,678.27 for the FPC Operating Fund, \$1,500 for the Care and Kindness Campaign, \$1,750 to support Anna Sheetz in her education, and \$4,000 to the Dodekah Ministry.

Additionally, \$10,000 was given to the Capital Campaign of the Domestic Violence Intervention Program, \$6,000 was given to the Enihakole Ministries, \$4,175 was given to Camp Wyoming for Cabin Updates and \$4,175 was provided to Pasrur for their Primary Building Project Fund. \$6,000 also paid for the efforts of Bob and Millie Youngquist as endowment coordinators.

Endowed funds (also called the corpus) differ from other gifts to the church in that the total amount of the gift is invested. Each year, only a portion of the income earned through these gifts is spent while the remainder is added to the principal for growth. In this respect, an endowment is a perpetual gift.

It should be said that the bulk of our endowment corpus is from estate gifts that have been received from members of our congregation who have left legacy gifts to our church. Other members have simply donated outright to the endowment fund in various ways. All of this funding has continued to grow and has been supporting programs we can now enjoy, but our hope is that many additional members of the congregation will also find it in their heart to give their own gifts to the church's endowment.

What part of church life means the most to you? Is there a ministry or program that has made a difference in your life, or a family member's life? A legacy gift to the church can keep that vital aspect of our community growing so it can bless others in the future. It's also possible to simply give to the endowment without specifying how the money can be used. Both types of gifts are a great blessing to our church.

Have you ever "paid it forward?" Bought coffee or paid the toll for the next person in line or given a gift to

someone because someone had done the same for you? Surely you have and It feels good to take care of someone like that. Right? A bequest is a simple, beautiful way to pay it forward for the next generation and take care of them in lasting ways.

If this thought has been haunting you during 2022, please don't just let this be a "can you continue to kick down the road" as something to deal with in the future. Please speak to Bob and Millie about this.

Certainly, major gifts would be a blessing to our church. Yet we encourage you to start with a gift of any size. You don't have to be wealthy to give a donation to the endowment. You just have to make the effort. Just donate in some small way. Get the endowment on your radar. Start imagining what our endowment can do not only for our church today but long into the future.

As usual, we suggest that you should work with your financial advisor if you choose to make any large financial gifts.

Communication and the process ...

Did you know that one of the roles of committee moderators at FPC is to monitor their budgets to avoid overspending? They must approve expenditures before they are made and then complete vouchers to attach to receipts. In this way, our Manager of Finance and Purchasing, Krista Livingston, knows a bill may be paid.



This process was developed to meet the recommendation of a financial review.

- 1. Before making an expenditure, a staff or committee member (the spender) should check with the committee moderator for approval. The moderator will make certain there are funds available in the budget for the expenditure. It is critical that moderators monitor their committee's budget during the year to be sure they are not overspending.
- 2. The spender makes the approved purchase and turns in the receipt to the moderator.
- 3. The moderator will complete a paper voucher (found in the copy room) and attach the receipt to the voucher. The moderator then places the voucher/receipt in Krista Livingston's mailbox.
- 4. If the moderator has difficulty signing the paper voucher, an email can be written giving approval for a specific expenditure and specifying the specific fund the expenditure should be paid from. The email should be sent to Krista Livingston at finance@firstpresiowacity.org. Krista will print the email and attach it to the receipt when she receives it.
- 5. Prior approval and a receipt must always be provided for reimbursement. Krista is unable to reimburse anyone without a voucher and corresponding receipt.*

Did you know that ... email 'spoofing' isn't the same as being 'hacked'?

Spoofing is an "impersonation" of an email (like our pastor and staff) that the computers can't differentiate. That's why it is important to check the *sent from* email address. If the email looks odd, double check.

FPC has good email protection against hacking (which is stealing an email address).



^{*}Communication is critical in this process. Moderators must sign off on the vouchers. Moderators need to sign the vouchers after the staff conveys there are vouchers to sign.






