The Session of First Presbyterian Church, Iowa City has joined with the Presbytery of East Iowa in condemning the desecration of Temple Emanuel. The action of the Session has been communicated to the members of First Presbyterian Church to encourage ecumenical unity and to display empathy to all people.

The Presbytery of East Iowa Statement Condemning the Vandalization of Temple Emanuel

Thursday, December 10, 2020, marked the beginning of the celebration of Hanukkah within the Jewish community. On Thursday afternoon, Temple Emanuel in Davenport was vandalized with graffiti referencing John 8:44 as an act of anti-Semitic violence. This text reads as follows: "You are from your father the devil, and you choose to do your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning and does not stand in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks according to his own nature, for he is a liar and the father of lies."

The Presbytery of East Iowa unequivocally condemns this vile act of anti-Semitism and its terrorization of a blessed people at the beginning of their celebration of the sacred holy days of Hanukkah. By this statement, we affirm our commitment to resist violence and injustice and to follow Jesus in loving our neighbors as ourselves.

Dear Members and Friends,

I was nineteen when the president was assassinated. Then Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., followed later by Robert Kennedy and Malcolm X. In between, there were demonstrations about the war in Vietnam, about civil rights, and families and communities seemed as divided then as our country feels divided now.

One march was around Boston Common. It was scheduled to culminate at the Arlington Street Church (which everyone spoke about as if it was obvious what made that church significant), where some young men were planning to be the first to turn in their draft cards in protest. "Is the FBI going to be there?" "Will they be arrested on the spot?" "Who will actually destroy their draft cards?"

As I've told my story of those years, I have often said, "I was frightened most of the time." One of us would turn over in bed after the morning alarm and immediately switch on the radio because certainly something awful would have happened overnight.



I've been feeling frightened for a few years again, only it's more intense today. I've wondered if previous generations felt that fear. Is that what it felt like when the white riot took place in Tulsa about 100 years ago, when family members left home to fight in WWI or WWII, or during the Great Depression?

Return to the basics. The basic promise is I will be your God and you will be my people. God will sustain, guide, and love, and God promises that this journey of life, sometimes okay but often challenging, will culminate in the realm of God, in God's presence. If we enjoy singing in our sanctuary in our day, imagine singing to God with the heavenly chorus.

Sign in to My First Pres

- 1. Go to FPC website, https://firstpresiowacity.org/, scroll down to the My First Pres box
- 2. Click on "Need a Login? Click Here"
- 3. You will be asked to enter your first name, last name and email. Enter this info and click "Find Me"
- **4.** You should see a note congratulating you on setting up your account.
- 5. Once you see that note, check your email for your username and temporary password
- 6. You will be able to change password once you login
- 7. You should open up to the HOME screen; look at MY COMPLETE PROFILE for your personal information, PLEASE make sure your address and phone numbers are correct, feel free to make any changes needed. Note: changes are verified and may take 24 hours to show up. You can also sign up for online giving, pledging and see your yearly giving.



Lent begins with Ash Wednesday February 17, 2021

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent with a public act of confession. Acknowledging that we have all sinned and fallen short of God's glory, we repent and return to our loving creator. Acutely aware of our failure and frailty, we express our utter reliance on God's saving grace.

Ash Wednesday developed in the medieval period as a time when penitent sinners were presented for church discipline during the



season of Lent, to be reconciled with the community of faith on Maundy Thursday. Ash Wednesday also came to be the occasion for new believers to enroll in the catechumenate, a period of preparation for baptism at Easter. For those who undertake spiritual disciplines, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Lenten fast.

Ashes are an ancient symbol of repentance, sorrow, and sacrifice. Traditionally, the ashes for this service are made from the palm branches of the previous year; thus the ashes and palms together frame the season of Lent. (From *The Book of Common Worship*, p. 247)

- Read or act out one or more of the scripture lessons for the day
- Read a prayer or other part of the liturgy for the day
- Play or sing some special music
- Dance, draw, paint, take a picture

We are especially looking for those who would like to lead hymns either vocally or on instruments.



Five Senses Meditation

As we enter a new and already tumultuous year and all that comes with it, consider adding a simple moment of meditation or mindfulness to your day or week. I would like to remind you about the "Five Senses Meditation" that is an easy and helpful way to calm your mind and body.

The goal is to calm your mind by using your five senses to focus on your environment instead of your thoughts.

Here are the steps to complete this exercise:



- First, notice 5 things that you can **see**. Look around you and become aware of your environment. Try to pick out something that you don't usually notice.
- Second, notice 4 things you can *feel*. Bring attention to the things that you're currently feeling, such as the texture of your clothing or the smooth surface of the table you're resting your hands on.
- Third, notice 3 things that you can *hear*. Listen for and notice things in the background that you don't normally notice. It could be the birds chirping outside or an appliance humming in the next room.
- Fourth, notice 2 things you can *smell*. Bring attention to scents that you usually filter out, either pleasant or unpleasant. Catch a whiff of the pine trees outside or food cooking in the kitchen.
- Finally, notice 1 thing you can taste. Take a sip of a drink, chew gum, or notice the current taste in your
 mouth.

You may start with any of the senses and work your way down in the number of things you notice.





Frequently Asked Questions

Each Member Can Give According to His or Her Ability

The purpose of this month's column is to give some general answers to questions that are frequently asked as we talk about supporting our church endowment. We suggest that donors consult with their attorney, accountant or tax advisor with regard to their personal situation.

1. Do I Need a Will?

Most likely. Without a will, the laws of the state will determine who will receive your assets and who will manage your estate. As a result, the state may not include all of the persons or charities that you would like to benefit. A will allows you to appoint a guardian for your minor children, choose a representative to carry out your wishes, and determine the final destination of your estate assets.

Making a charitable bequest (i.e., giving assets to the church or another charity through a will or living trust) is the simplest way to make a planned gift. The donor states in his or her will the amount or percentage of assets that are to pass to a designated charity. The donor receives an estate tax deduction for the amount of the bequest. There is no limit on the amount that can be deducted for estate tax purposes.

Some may wish to designate their church or favorite charity as the "residual beneficiary" of their estate. After they have designated certain amounts to children, friends and charities, they may wish to name the church as the residual beneficiary to receive the balance of their estate after all other distributions have been made.

2. What Is Planned Giving?

"Planned giving" means mapping out a plan for making gifts to church and charity. A caring person integrates planned giving into his or her financial strategies during different phases of life. Many individuals consider planned giving when they decide how to transfer their estates to the institutions and people whom they want to benefit from a lifetime of hard work. In addition to fulfilling their charitable goals and acknowledging (financially and spiritually) their gratefulness to God, donors may receive tax benefits and lifetime incomes

through several types of tax-favored plans. We'll discuss some of these opportunities in future columns.

Planned giving takes many forms and is tailored to meet the needs and goals of the donor. Each person's dreams make each gift unique and important. Martin Luther stated, "The heart of the giver makes the gift dear and precious."

3. How Can Life Insurance Be Used to Make Charitable Gifts?

Charitable gifts of life insurance provide an easy way for the donor to make charitable contributions with minimal current costs. In many instances, a gift of life insurance involves a small out-of-pocket premium each year yet produces a significant benefit to a charity. There are many ways to make a charitable gift of life insurance.

First, an existing contract may be given to charity, in which case all ownership rights must be assigned to the charity, and the charity named as beneficiary. If no further premium payments are due on the contract, the donor will receive a charitable income tax deduction for the lesser of the replacement value of the contract or the total value of the premium payments paid. However, if premiums remain to be paid on the contract, the donor will receive a charitable income tax deduction for the lesser of the interpolated terminal reserve value of the contract, or the total value of premium payments paid. The donor will also receive additional deductions for future premium payments.

Second, a donor may purchase a new contract naming the charity as beneficiary. If the donor makes an absolute assignment of the contract to the charity, the donor will receive a charitable income tax deduction for each premium payment made on the contract. As long as the charity is the owner of the contract, the proceeds will be excluded from the donor's estate.

Finally, a donor may designate the church as the beneficiary of a life insurance contract that he or she continues to own. Although the donor will not receive an income tax deduction for the gift, he or she will receive a charitable estate tax deduction for the amount of the

death benefit passing to charity. Donors can also name a charity as a contingent beneficiary, providing the charity with the death benefit in the event that the primary beneficiary predeceases the donor.

We hope that we have provided some food for thought in this month's column. There are many other questions to cover in future columns so do stay tuned.



*The term Shamash is used in the Hebrew tradition to describe a candle that lights other candles. You can see it in the menorah above. It is the candle in the middle that sits above the rest.
