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Dear Church-

Happy January! And, before the next newsletter, Happy Lent! As you likely know already, our Lenten and Easter cycles follow a lunar calendar Easter, in the Western Christian Tradition, falls on the first Sunday following the full moon that occurs on or after the Spring Equinox. Which means Easter is in MARCH this year (March 28, to be precise). Counting back six weeks puts Ash Wednesday on February 14, an auspicious date to gather and consider Jesus's journey of reflection in the wilderness (after a soup supper at 6pm). Keep an eye out in our weekly emails and worship announcements for Wednesday evening Lenten activities, which will be geared toward contemplation and reflection in different forms.

But that's still a month away! As we begin ministries with the new members we welcome on January 14 and the elders and deacons we elected on January 7 (thank you, Loretta, for moderating the semi-annual meeting in my absence!), we have a little bit of time to think about what we want 2024 to be. What are your hopes in your own lives and the life of the church? What is the thing that you don't want to leave undone in this year? We're starting to think about those questions in our Session and Deacons, and it's a great time to think about it in our own lives, too.

In the Synoptic gospels (Mark, Matthew, and Luke), Jesus is baptized and immediately goes out into the wilderness to consider what the baptismal revelations to him mean. In John, he doesn't head out to be tempted, but you can see him working it out miracle by miracle along the way, building up greater and greater miracles until the end. Both stories show him to be someone who thinks about how it is he's going to grow, and where he's going to go in his life and ministry. In like manner, we can set aside some time every year to ask the same question: where are we going, and how are we going to get there?

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. Blood is essential to help patients survive surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illnesses, and traumatic injuries. Creation Care in Colorado: \$350


Students in 5th-8th Grade who attend BOTH trips: \$500 (a \$115 savings!)

Building the Legacy

Have you remembered the church in your will?

The FPC Endowment and Memorials Committee Bob and Millie Youngquist, Coordinators

As leaders in our First Presbyterian Church, it's our job to ask our fellow church members to give from a lifetime of accumulated assets to ensure that our church will be here for future generations. Through our FPC endowment and planned giving program, we have created a framework for inviting others into lifelong comprehensive Christian stewardship, reflecting that all that we are and all that we have is from God.

This month, here are more ways that donations could be structured:

Bequests – There are several generally accepted ways to make a bequest:

- 1) Specific bequest. This is the gift of a specific item to a specific beneficiary. For example, "I give my golf clubs to my nephew, John."
- 2) General bequest. This is usually a gift of a stated sum of money. For example, "I give \$50,000 to my daughter, Mary."
- 3) Contingent bequest. This is a bequest made on condition that a certain event must occur before distribution to the beneficiary. For example, "I give \$50,000 to my son, Joe, provided he enrolls in college before age 21."
- 4) Residuary bequest. This is a gift of all the "rest, residue and remainder" of your estate after all other bequests, debts and taxes have been paid.

Life Estate – An individual may transfer to FPC title (i.e., remainder interest) to a personal residence, farm or other real estate, and the donor or other persons named by the donor may retain the use of the property for a term of years or the life of the donor/ other persons (i.e., life estate). The donor receives a charitable deduction in the year of the gift, which may be carried over for five additional years.

Life Insurance – There are various methods by which a life insurance policy may be contributed:

- 1) A donor may assign irrevocably a paid-up policy.
- 2) A donor may assign irrevocably to FPC a life insurance policy on which premiums remain to be paid.

- A donor may name FPC as primary or successor beneficiary, but not owner of a life insurance policy.
- 4) Un-needed life insurance policies. Do you have a life insurance policy that you no longer need? Perhaps one that your parents bought when you were a child. Possibly one that you bought to fund your children's education. You might want to give the policy to FPC. It's painless and you will receive an income tax deduction.

Retirement Plan Designation – Donors may designate FPC as primary or contingent beneficiary of a retirement plan pursuant to their plan's appropriate designation procedure (i.e., specific forms).

Real Estate – donors may also give real estate (home or vacation property), S corporation stock, stock options, or closely held stock.

You don't have to hassle with selling the real estate. You can deed the property directly to First Presbyterian or ask your attorney to add a few sentences in your will or trust agreement.

You can give real estate to First Presbyterian in the following ways:


- An outright gift
- A gift in your will or living trust
- A retained life estate
- A charitable remainder unitrust
- A charitable lead trust
- A memorial or endowed gift

Our recent newsletters have offered many gift opportunities that can be utilized in supporting our FPC endowment and memorials. We hope our thoughts have been helpful to you. As is always true, remember that donors should seek the counsel of professional advisors for legal, accounting, investment and other professional advice when making any large financial decisions.
