Dear Church,

You may have noticed that the liturgical seasons of the church, in many ways, are mirror images of the natural seasons, at least in the northern hemisphere (I was recently informed by my Australian brother-in-law that the equivalent of June bugs there are "Christmas Beetles," since they show up in December). In the shortened, colder days of the winter, the church season is full of activity—the initially penitential four weeks of Advent, the celebratory fortnight of Christmas, the bright festival of Epiphany. After a quieter period in January and February, we have the 40—day Lenten preparation for Easter to provide us with some structure just as our patience with winter begins to run out. Then Spring arrives. We celebrate the greening ground and emergent wildlife with 50 days of Easter resurrection and then slide into what is variously called "Ordinary Time" or "the season after Pentecost), which lasts from late May or June until the end of October without disruption.

FROM OUR PASTOR

I write this letter on June 6, following the last liturgical gasp of spring (Holy Trinity Sunday) and looking toward the long and unbroken period of growth ahead of us. As a preacher and service leader, the summer is both daunting and rewarding. The thematic changes of the liturgy give a natural motion to the late fall, winter, and spring months, inspiring ideas for hymns, for prayers, and for special moments in worship, but also frequently leave little time for exploring the longer story arcs of the Bible. The summer, by contrast, gives us no planning support, but leaves us the freedom to look at those big, thick books at the beginning of the Bible and understand them in their context. So that's what we're going to do this summer in the services I'll be leading! Do you have questions about Sarah, Abraham, Isaac, Ishmael, Rebecca, Jacob, Esau, Rachel, and their contemporaries? We've got the whole summer and lots of lovely light to read by. And while our summer lives eschew the structure of the fall, winter, and spring, we've got more opportunities to come and try new things: a

Stewardship Never Takes a Break

And, just like that, summer has begun. Sunday School classes have wrapped up, the Dodekah group has returned from Scotland, and the vocal and bell choirs are on summer break. But you know what? Stewardship continues all year long! That's right, the financial responsibility we demonstrate to God and the church is just as compelling in June, July, and August as it is the other nine months. And, your Stewardship Committee is creating ways for us all to connect with this critical role we play in the life of the church.

Here are two goals that the committee has implemented to-date:

Goal #1:To raise awareness of our church's mission statement

Our mission statement is our identity and communicates to all our relationship to God through acts of justice, mercy, and faith in God's world. By now, it's apparent that Pastor Nathan connects every worship service to the FPC mission statement. The statement is also included in all meeting minutes and church communication. Elders even had a pop quiz on writing the mission statement at last month's Session meeting. (Which they passed with flying colors!)

Goal #2:To encourage members in discovering the underlying reason for their financial gifts to the church

This goal was first publicized in the April-May newsletter in an article that emphasized the "why" of giving to the church. Since then, I've led a number of people through a process called **The 5 Whys** that allows individuals to dig deeper into discovering their true reason for financially supporting FPC. Anyone can actually do this on their own. Just ask yourself why you give to FPC, and respond with, "Why is this important to me?" Answer that question and respond again with, "Why is this important to me? By the time you have asked "why" five times, you know your bottom answer, and it often is very revealing to discover your true reason. We'll be hearing from several members what they discovered is their reason for giving in future newsletters.

So, indeed, stewardship never takes a break. We are continuously connecting our actions to our mission statement, and discovering again and again just why we give of ourselves and our financial gifts to the church. Stay tuned to learn what else the Committee is planning to keep the importance of stewardship always in our thoughts.



First Presbyterian Church continues its support of Ecumenical Towers

Did you know that there is an apartment building in downtown lowa City with which our congregation has a long-standing connection? The Ecumenical Towers apartment building, located at 320 East Washington St., adjacent to the Senior Center, serves housing needs of low income seniors and persons with disabilities. Ecumenical Towers had its start in 1977 when twelve lowa City churches formed the Ecumenical Housing Corporation with the goal of developing a facility to meet housing needs of seniors and persons with disabilities in lowa City. Construction began in 1980, with the first resident moving into the facility in late 1981. Ecumenical Towers is celebrating 41 years of service to lowa City.

The eleven—story ET building has 81 units. As a Housing and Urban Development (HUD) project, rents are subsidized and the building is managed in accordance with HUD regulations. There is an on-site staff, including a resident relations specialist, a service



coordinator, and a maintenance specialist. A property management group operates the building under the direction of a local board.

Ecumenical Towers is governed by an 11-member Board of Directors, with one representative from each of the founding congregations. These are:
Congregational Church of Christ, First Christian
Church, First Mennonite Church, First Presbyterian
Church, First United Methodist Church, Gloria Dei
Lutheran Church, St. Andrew Presbyterian Church, St.
Mark's United Methodist Church, St. Thomas More
Catholic Church, St. Wenceslaus Church, and Trinity
Episcopal Church.

The 1840 Legacy Society

Ever since its founding in 1840, the mission of First Presbyterian Church of Iowa City in the service of Jesus Christ has been sustained by the commitment and vision of generous donors. With the establishment of an operating Endowment, many have chosen to permanently strengthen FPC with gifts to the Endowment, both unrestricted and restricted.

First Presbyterian is grateful to the individuals whose thoughtful planning has helped ensure a vibrant future for the Church. The Church honors donors who have made Endowment gifts of current or future support through membership in The 1840 Legacy Society, named to recognize the founding of FPC in 1840.

The Session established the Society in 2011 with Thirteen Charter Members. Since that time, ten additional names have been added. These names are listed in the 1840 Legacy brochure which is available in the narthex. Members are recognized in the church's annual report and are invited to special events and programs. Membership may be anonymous.

You are invited to join *The 1840 Legacy Society* by supporting FPC in one or more of the following ways:

Establishing a will or trust provision with FPC as a beneficiary

- Making a \$5,000 or more outright gift of cash or its equivalent to the FPC Endowment
- Making a minimum \$5,000 gift to the First Presbyterian Church of Iowa City Agency Fund at the Community Foundation of Johnson County
- Designating FPC as the owner and/or beneficiary of all or a portion of a life insurance policy
- Naming the FPC as a beneficiary of all or a portion of a retirement plan
- Establishing a charitable gift annuity with FPC as beneficiary
- Establishing a charitable trust with FPC as a beneficiary
- Making a gift to FPC of real property and retaining a life


and better connected to each other. While it isn't up and running yet, we wanted to give
