Dear sisters and brothers of First Presbyterian Church,

The grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you!

This year Easter Sunday and April's Fool's Day coincide. This seems especially relevant in our home region. I love lowa City. Nevertheless, over the years I have come to realize just how irreligious the place is. On more than one occasion a good, open-minded and progressive Christian has described to me being shamed into silence because he or she spoke of having a faith to the wrong person. To be mocked is no fun: It makes you feel foolish.

Paul speaks of those who love Jesus Christ as being fools—clowns—for Christ's sake. He was responding to the Corinthian Christians who considered themselves Paul's intellectual superiors. We may recognize the feeling: We can be made to feel pretty foolish sometimes, especially when it comes to this whole business of Jesus's resurrection. The *Scientific American March 2017 Skeptic* section tore into the belief, gently asking how intelligent people can embrace such nonsense. I consider myself a moderately intelligent person, and I have been mulling my response ever since reading the article.

Here it is, in brief. In the Newtonian physics of the last century, the physical universe in which many educated persons believed did not allow for resurrection. It was considered physically impossible.

The times have changed, however. In the weird quantum universe in which it seems we really live, miracles have been upgraded a bit. As unlikely as it seems, resurrection may be possible, however remote the possibility may be. Put differently, resurrection is not impossible: It is merely an extremely low probability event.

We know that low probability events do happen in the everyday world. A few years ago on a very windy day, a 10-year-old English girl named Laura Buxton released a red balloon with her contact information attached. Some time later, another 10-year-old girl named Laura Buxton found that the red balloon landed near her home. The two did not know each other, yet they looked similar to each other and had similar likes and hobbies.

Statisticians would note that the odds of this happening only once are very slim, but not impossible. A more careful examination of the circumstances might even lead to the conclusion that the odds are better than slim.

Nevertheless, for those of us with overly active imaginations, most events in life that we can imagine may have a very low probability of happening; yet they cannot be discounted altogether just for the reason of statistical probability. Indeed, we might tell ourselves that "every dog has its day," that is, even a very low probability event sometimes can happen.

Some contemporary scientists try to dodge this conclusion

by emphasizing the whole idea of multiple universes. According to this theory, everything that happens in our own universe is 100% sure and predictable, and resurrections are precluded. Yet what is true about our universe doesn't



preclude the possibility of resurrection in some other universe. In other words, unlikely events like the resurrection are not precluded "out there, somewhere." They are just outsourced to alternative universes and precluded from our own.

At the same time, other scientists pose the theory of multiple universes or M (string theory) as virtual facts, although as facts they may lie outside of our ability to prove definitively. So scientists also invite us to have faith in their math and conclusions.


I am game to opening myself to the possibility that they are right, embracing that their guess is a highly reasoned one. Yet it is still a guess, a leap of imagination. I would just like the same courtesy. Nothing I have stated is proof of resurrection or even the possibility of it. I am merely suggesting a quid pro quo, faith for faith. In similar manner, as should scientists be of their certitudes, you and I should also be highly skeptical of our own.

I don't have math on my side to prove the resurrection. I do embrace it on faith based on mystical experiences of the Risen Christ experienced by more people than just I, as well as the number of changed lives I have witnessed in my past 60 years.

I believe that our beloved irreligious friends should have all the room they need to believe or not to believe whatever they wish. Furthermore, they seem to take such delight in teasing us that it would be a shame to ruin their fun.

Yet, as we hear the same unbelievably improbable story of the Risen Christ and the invitation to be Christ's clowns, you and I should take comfort in the words of a genius who may or may not have possessed a faith. Albert Einstein once observed that "Great spirits are always opposed by mediocre minds." Ain't it the truth!

So believe all you want: I do. Be a fool ,and Happy Easter! With love, your pastor, Sam

and declare that God calls us to cherish, protect and restore this earth.

2. In **education**, we will seek learning and teaching opportunities to know and understand the threats to God's creation and the damage already inflicted. We will encourage and support each other in finding ways of keeping and healing the creation in response to God's call to earth-keeping, justice and community.



- 3. Our **facilities** will be managed, maintained and upgraded in a manner that respects and cherishes all creation, human and non-human, while meeting equitably the needs of all people. In our buildings and on our grounds we will use energy efficiently, conserve resources, and share what we have in abundance so that God's holy creation will be sustainable for all life and future generations.
- 4. Our **outreach** will encourage public policy and community involvement that protects and restores the vulnerable and degraded earth as well as oppressed and neglected people. We will be mindful that our personal and collective actions can positively or negatively affect our neighborhood, region, nation and world. We will seek to achieve environmental justice through coalitions and ecumenical partnerships.

With this commitment in mind, we are hosting an Interfaith Power & Light program on Saturday, April 14 from 9:00 a.m.—noon. You will learn how to take steps to save money and energy at home, make a faith-based pledge to reduce your carbon footprint and explore efficiency and renewable energy in this program called Cool Congregations. 



February 2018 Session Highlights

Clerk of Session, Nancy Weber

The session met February 20 in Coover Lounge at 7 p.m. Pastor Sam called the meeting to order and lit the Christ candle. Elder Sharon Raffensperger offered opening devotions and read Ephesians 1:3 on "Blessings," then led us in prayer.

We welcomed Pastor Tim Dick, Representative of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, who explained the role of a Commissioned Ruling Elder, the process of becoming one, and how the FPC session would support a CRE. His explanation was given in preparation of Session interviewing FPC Elder Gary Olson at the March 2018 meeting for enrollment to become a Commissioned Ruling Elder.

Jeremy Fletcher from REALM Planning passed out the "FPC Church Ministry Organization Plan 2018" and asked Session to take a look at it over the next week or two, and offer feedback to him or REALM co-chair and elder Carol Ulch.

Three baptisms were noted. On January 28, 2018, Lucas William Edwards, son of Rachel and Jack Edwards, was baptized by Pastor Sam Massey, and on February 4, 2018, Scarlett Marie Sales and John "Jack" David Sales III, children of Christine Walsh and John Sales, and grandchildren of elder Nancy Gardner, were also baptized by Pastor Sam.

The February 12, 2018 birth of Ruby Josephine Anderson, daughter of Sara Schwartz and Michael Anderson was noted.

Three deaths were noted. Dick Dustin passed away on January 16, 2018. His funeral was held at FPC and led by Pastor Sam Massey. Hazel Long passed away on January 25, 2018, and a memorial out of state will take place at a later date. On February 14, 2018, Boni Swails passed away, with columbarium interment on February 24, 2018, and Pastor Sam Massey officiating.

The recent website activity report was attached.

Finance moderator and elder Dale Kraus announced the 2018 budget was approved, and current financial status looks good.

Minutes of the January 16, 2018 stated session meeting were approved, as were the minutes of the February 11, 2018 congregational meeting, and the minutes of the February 12, 2018 Capital Campaign Implementation Team task force meeting

Session approved the re-commission of elder Richard Van Rheeden and deacon Judy Terry to Presbytery.

A motion to revise the endowment articles was approved by session members in attendance. The endowment articles to replace are listed immediately below (excerpts pg. 2, section d, i, ii, iii and iv. adopted Aug 8, 2010):

- d. To create an Endowment that will be maintained in perpetuity and which shall consist of two parts (see Attachment 1):
 - Restricted—whereby the donor specifies how and for what the gift to this fund shall be used.
 Examples are the Updegraff Fund and the Columbarium Fund.
 - ii. Unrestricted Funds—whereby the donor does not specify how the gift shall be used.
 - iii. The principal of gifts, devises and requests to the Endowment shall be held as a whole unless, by the terms of any such gift, a specific purpose is stated whereby the gift shall be held and distributed in accordance with the directions of the donor.
 - iv. The Endowment shall not be used to substitute for, or enrich, the annual budget of the Church, nor shall it be loaned. The corpus of the Endowment, as of the adoption of this revised Plan shall be \$600,000.

This will be replaced with the following proposed revisions and options:

- d. To create an Endowment that will be maintained in perpetuity and which shall consist of two parts (see Attachment 1):
 - i. Restricted—whereby the donor specifies how and for what the gift to this fund shall be used.
 Examples are the Updegraff Fund and the Columbarium Fund.
 - ii. Unrestricted Funds whereby the donor does not specify how the gift shall be used.
 - iii. The principal of gifts, devises and requests to the Endowment shall be held as a whole unless, by the terms of any such gift, a specific purpose is stated whereby the gift shall be held and distributed in accordance with the directions of the donor.
 - iv. The Endowment corpus shall not be used to substitute for, or enrich, the annual budget of the Church, nor shall it be loaned.
 - v. The annual earnings of the unrestricted portion of the Endowment, to a maximum of 50 percent, may be used to supplement the General Fund of First Presbyterian Church. An amount equivalent to such a percentage shall be reserved by the Endowment each year until the date of October 1. If Session does not request the transfer of those funds by this date, the Endowment may use these funds for other purposes authorized by this Endowment Plan.

Session approved the decision to rescind the following motion, approved at October 17, 2017 session meeting: "Equipping Ministry proposed an ecumenical intergenerational program ('mini Synod School') tentatively planned for June 7-9, 2018 at First Presbyterian in federal custody in Mt. Pleasant.) The family is in dire Church. A planning committee, consisting of session members from different ministries as well as members from the congregation, will be assembled to plan and coordinate the program."

Session authorized the Finance Committee to explore opportunities that address needs identified in FPC's Strategic Plan that also have the potential to generate long-term income by leveraging assets and other resources through various financial avenues, partnerships and organizational structures in the greater lowa City area.

Church officers for 2018 were approved, with Larry Bruner as treasurer, Dale Kraus as vice-president, Jeri Smith as president.

Session approved the replacement of the wooden folding chairs in the storage closet used in Ryerson Fellowship Hall, using unrestricted and undesignated accumulated memorial funds (estimated cost: \$1,305 plus tax, out of \$1,833 total) to buy 50 new ones and a storage rack.

A motion was approved to create a Green Initiatives 20account and to begin soliciting designated donations for the Green Initiatives 20-account via the giving kiosk, the website, and an offering for seed money. The fund monies will be dispersed by Servanthood Ministries.

July 2018 RAGBRAI provides an opportunity for fundraising for FPC. A motion proposing an overnight, plus hosting dinner, with proceeds and other opportunities for fundraising to be designated with Servanthood ministry distributing as needed, was approved. This motion implies approval of offering our buildings and grounds to be offered by our volunteers to host RAGBRAI events and riders. We've been asked by a group from Pella to serve as their host.

Session approved a special offering to be held to provide funds for an undocumented immigrant family in need. (Explanation: Elder Michelle Bessman became aware of

the father of a fifth grader at her school—the father also has a wife and three other children, including a baby at home, and is the sole breadwinner—being picked up by police and accused of being unregistered. He is currently straits. Servanthood will solicit the congregation for tangible items such as diapers (size 4), toilet paper, toothpaste, shampoo and baby wipes. Money is also needed to pay bills, and so the request was to ask the congregation for monetary aid also. Additional note: 80% of immigrants picked up for lack of registration, if they are released on bond, are eventually released and not deported. If bond cannot be paid, however, 80% of these persons are deported with little due process. Clearly iustice cannot be done if bond is not provided, although right now financial needs for the family are primarily related to survival.

A special session meeting was called for February 25, 2018, at 9 a.m., in room 14, to welcome three new members.

A fundraising task force report was given by elder Richard Van Rheeden. The Robert Burns birthday celebration is in the planning stage, and will include haggis, a bagpiper, and a silent auction. A fee of \$20/person is being considered, and the date is set for January 25, 2019.

The trunk sale will be held the second Saturday in June of each year. The fundraising task force is still exploring the idea of FPC becoming a possible source for Coralville, Iowa City city meetings.

Elder Van Rheeden passed out an article about restaurants exploring alternatives to plastic straws—perhaps we might offer a metal straw with the FPC logo on it.

Elder Nancy Gardner reported that we hosted another successful Parents Night Out. Elder Ann Grosscup provided food for the children.

Elder Vern Dengler closed the meeting with prayer. The next session meeting will be held March 20, 2018 at 7 p.m., in Coover Lounge.

... you shall not oppress the immigrant. The immigrant who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the immigrant as yourself, for you were immigrants in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:33-34 and 24:22).

What does it mean to love Jesus Christ in a society hostile to unregistered immigrants, the very ones for whom God says we must care, the ones whom Jesus called the least of his sisters and brothers? We will be discerning this very question on Sunday, April 15, 22 and 29, following worship, approximately 12 noon to 1:30 p.m. Light snacks will be served. One Great Hour of Sharing - Special Offering

During Lent, Presbyterians have participated in the longstanding ecumenical effort of One Great Hour of Sharing. We have shared God's love by giving to ministries that provide relief to those affected by natural disasters, food for the hungry, and support towards the self-development of poor and oppressed communities.

How does your money help?

32% goes to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance – Working alongside communities as they recover and find hope after natural or human-caused disasters. In the fall of 2017, immediate relief was provided to Harvey, Irma and Maria hurricane devastation.

36% goes to Presbyterian Hunger Program – Supporting initiatives that create sustainable food systems and alleviate root causes of poverty so that all may be fed. For example, Action for Rural Women's Empowerment

provides support and land rights training in Uganda for property retention. These efforts work to address long-term care of the earth to end hunger and poverty for the most vulnerable.

32% goes to Self-Development of People – Providing resources and education to oppressed and disadvantaged communities working to overcome poverty and injustice through initiatives they own and directly benefit from. For example, The Genesis Youth Organizing Internship Project is supported through funding. This project is comprised primarily of lowincome minority youth seeking to disrupt School-to-Prison Pipeline related problems in Oakland, California.

Food Buying Club Welcomes New Members

You are invited to join our food buying club that purchases monthly from United Natural Foods (UNFI) and Frontier Co-op, both major wholesale suppliers for New Pioneer Co-op. UNFI carries a wide variety of organic, vegan, low-salt, and gluten-free foods; Frontier Co-op carries herbs, teas, supplements, and personal care products. We pick up our purchases at First Presbyterian Church (our church liaison is Rhonda Barr) on

the third Thursday of the month. This 37-year-old buying club is named "Koinonia," from the Greek word meaning fellowship. We remain committed to our original goals — buying quality food inexpensively, discouraging overpackaged food, and promoting good health. Member households assist with the food pick-up and distribution 2-3 times a year and currently pay no fees. Prayer Shawl Ministry Going Strong at FPC

The **Prayer Shawl Ministry** came about through the Needles, Hooks and Yarn small group. In 2005, a few ladies got together to "just" knit and spend time together. It was decided that we would take on mission work by providing hand-made hats, mittens and scarves to local charity organizations. We also began doing sweaters for the *Guidepost* project.

As news of our group began to grow, we were offered donations of yarn from members of the congregation. We received a variety of yarns—mostly older

acyclic yarns that worked perfectly for the winter wear. As our group grew, we ventured out into other projects—helmet liners for soldiers, specialty winter wear for arctic fishermen and the prayer shawls, just to name a few. Currently, we have about 10 different charities we donate our goods to.

We distributed our first prayer shawl in 2007 to Sharon McMillan to comfort her as she valiantly fought cancer. Only 8 shawls were given out that year, but it was clear we had found our mission project. The shawls are incredibly meaningful and show a tangible example of God's presence in our lives, not only to those who receive the shawls but for those who make them.

The more seasoned members began to make shawls with greater design and patterns. We have a library of several patterns—beginners to advanced from scarves to shawls and most things in between. Over 170 shawls have been delivered to those in need of comforting since this ministry began in 2007.

We have a few on hand at the church, so one is always close when needed. Our most impressive shawl was made for Pastor Sam during his time of surgery in 2010. It was over 6 feet long and about 5 feet wide. Several members each made a strip – similar to a scarf and then they were sewn together for the final shawl.

The yarn for the shawls is bought primarily by the person making the shawl. We try and use nice, soft and washable yarn. It is important not to use anything

scratchy as our goal is comfort. We have several baby blankets on hand, as well, for the newest members of the FPC family. We have also done fleece tie blankets for children who may not enjoy a shawl as much as a blanket to snuggle up in.

We try to keep an eye open for sales and stock up. Anyone wanting to donate yarn or contribute to the purchase of yarn can

always do so; it is greatly appreciated.

Tammy Schroeder has a running list of all the shawls/ blankets delivered; if you are visiting a person and are curious if they have received a shawl/blanket, give her a call. If they have not, this is the perfect time to swing by the church, pick one up and deliver this lovely gift.




