# The Advent Season begins November 28

"Advent" means "coming" or "arrival."
During the season of Advent, we celebrate
Christ's coming into the world and watch
with expectant hope for his coming again. In
its historical origins, the season of Advent



was patterned after the season of Lent, a six-week period of penitence and preparation for Easter. Similarly, the four weeks of Advent present an opportunity for communal discernment and personal examination, as the church prepares to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord and looks with hope for Christ's return.

#### Between memory and hope

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 96)

In Advent we expectantly wait for the One who has already come. We anticipate the promised justice of God's new world, yet we praise God who raised the "righteous branch" to rule with justice and righteousness. We hope for the restoration of the afflicted, the tormented, and the grieving, yet we delight that healing has come in Christ. We long for the beating of swords into plowshares, yet we rejoice that the Prince of Peace has appeared. We yearn for the barren deserts of our inner cities to flourish, yet we laud the desert Rose that has bloomed. We dream of the land where lions and lambs live in harmony, yet we acclaim the child born to lead us into the promised land.

Christ has come! Christ is risen! Christ will come again! In Advent, we are living between the first and the second coming of the Lord. The dialectical tension of maranatha [alternately translated "Come, our Lord!" or "Our Lord has come"] — placing us between memory and hope, past and future — may strengthen our Advent liturgies. Perhaps we need to cling to the ancient cry of maranatha! and its paradoxical meanings so we may freely embrace "the new thing" prophesied by Isaiah (Isaiah 43:19) that God is doing among us right now. The tension and paradox we find in Advent shapes our celebrations during the season.

#### Dear Members and Friends,

When I interviewed with the interim pastor search committee, I told them I had a love/hate relationship with being an interim pastor. The love part of interim ministry is meeting you, being challenged by you, learning from you, being forgiven by you for my mistakes, working with you, cherishing special moments with you, and all of this in the unique circumstances of wearing masks, maintaining social distance, and most of the time remaining safely inside our residences.

The hate part of the work of interim ministry is leaving, saying good-bye, feeling grief at the end of our time together, losing out on the privilege of seeing you in person without masks, not doing some of the things together that I thought we would be doing.

But there's a more painful part. It's the part that comes from professional ethics, particularly the ethics that apply at the end of a pastoral relationship. A pastor is obligated to say good-bye.

A pastoral good-bye means we won't be in contact with each other, and the relationships will live in our memories. That means I cannot stay in touch — call, text, email, snail mail, follow you on social media, or send balloons into the sky over lowa City to say hello. The professional obligation is to clear the emotional field for the new pastor.

It feels awful writing this. People might conclude that our relationship didn't matter to me. That's not true in any way. Leaving a congregation – leaving FPC – does matter to me. It hurts in a powerful way. I'm already beginning to miss you. I'll think about you on the third

Tuesday of the month (Session meetings), when I do not turn on YouTube to watch worship, when I imagine more and more people coming to worship, when I anticipate that the long-waited-for



day of singing and hearing the choir sing may have arrived. As an interim, I have never had the joy of watching children grow up in church or seeing love blossom and people marry, of grieving with you when someone that we have known together for a long time dies.

You could ask this question: if this is so painful, why do you do it? I do it because I've been called to serve this way. I do it because the joy of being with you far outweighs the pain of saying good-bye. I do it because I am convinced a transitional process is beneficial to most congregations.


It is difficult saying good-bye since we are not yet having significant gatherings in the building. I will continue to be available by phone and in the office until November 21. If the ethics of pastoral departure are not clear, I will be accessible to talk about them, too.

I will continue praying for FPC, for your ministry, and for the advent of a new pastor.

May God bless and keep you, be gracious and kind to you, and may God's face be upon you and grant you peace.



## **Updates from Pasrur**



On Sunday October 17<sup>th</sup>, Veda Gill (Executive Director of the Presbyterian Education Board in Pakistan) gave a presentation via Zoom to our church. She shared a video of the girls at the Pasrur Christian boarding house, gave us an update on the school, and talked about some of their concerns. The presentation was live via Zoom and included time for questions and discussion.

Veda told us that their major concern is the primary block of classrooms. The block of classrooms was constructed in 1906 and has outlived its lifespan. The mortar used was mud which cannot reliably be repaired. There are serious concerns about the safety in the classrooms. They hope for a new building that would include 4 classrooms, a wide veranda, and a bathroom at a total cost of \$200,000.

It was wonderful to see Veda and to get so many of our supporters together, if only on our computer screens. ## As we gather, are you protected?

The medical community is predicting a heavier flu season, compounded by ongoing CoVID outbreaks. The Congregational Health Ministry Team is advising and encouraging everyone who is able to get vaccinated with:

- An Influenza vaccination as soon as possible (6 months and older).
- A CoVID-19 vaccination (5 years and older), as well as a booster, if you are eligible.

We have some tips on how to prevent the spread of all respiratory viruses while worshipping at FPC:



- 1. <u>Stay home if you are ill.</u> You can worship with us from home on YouTube; the link is on the FPC home page (FirstPreslowaCity.org). Stay home until you are cleared by your primary care provider (CoVID) or fever and symptom free for at least 24 hours (Influenza).
- 2. Wear Your Mask, and physically distance yourself at least 6 feet from others who are not in your household. There is plenty of room to spread out seating in the sanctuary.
- 3. <u>During worship:</u> it is advisable not to touch your eyes, nose or mouth where the virus can enter your body readily. If you need to cough or sneeze, keep your mask on, and cover with your elbow. If you need to use a tissue, do so as quickly as you can. Throw the tissue away immediately into a trash can, or put away in a pocket. After you use a tissue, wash your hands for at least 20 seconds with warm water and soap (sing Jesus Loves Me) or use a hand sanitizer. Keep a small bottle with you at all times!
- 4. <u>Passing the Peace</u>: avoid shaking hands. Alternatives to handshakes: bow, smile, wave, or the "peace" sign.
- 5. **Fellowship**: There will be no formal fellowship hour. It is advised to leave the sanctuary immediately after worship and avoid crowding. If you want to visit with others, plan to do so outside the church.
- 6. <u>Influenza or CoVID</u>? There are many similarities in how they spread and symptoms. If you are sick, you should see your doctor to get tested. #### The 1840 Legacy Society

Ever since its founding in 1840, the mission of First Presbyterian Church of Iowa City in the service of Jesus Christ has been sustained by the commitment and vision of generous donors. With the establishment of an operating endowment, many have chosen to permanently strengthen the church with gifts to the endowment, both unrestricted and restricted.

First Presbyterian Church is grateful to the individuals whose thoughtful planning has helped ensure a vibrant future for the church. The church honors donors who have made endowment gifts of current or future support through membership in *The 1840*Legacy Society, named to recognize the founding of FPC in 1840.

The Session established the Society in 2011 with 13 Charter Members. Since that time, 10 additional names have been added. These names are listed in the 1840 Legacy Brochure which is available in the narthex. Members are recognized in the church's annual report and are invited to special events and programs. Membership may be anonymous.

You are invited to join *The 1840 Legacy Society* by supporting FPC in one or more of the following ways:

- Establishing a will or trust provision with the church as a beneficiary
- Making a \$5,000 or more outright gift of cash or its equivalent to the FPC Endowment

#### **Elder Nominees, Class of 2024**

Bill Follows grew up in New York City and as a child was invited to join an Episcopal boys' choir. Thereafter, he always joined the church choir every place he lived. #### Successful Warm Winter Wear Distribution

In its second year of a "pandemic format," the Consultation of Religious Communities, of which First Presbyterian Church is a founding member, conducted another successful Warm Winter Wear Distribution. Over the three-and-a-half day distribution, 276 households received 1,309 coats and other warm winter wear such as hats, gloves / mittens, scarves, snow pants, sweaters and boots. An additional 104 coats were distributed to the Catholic Worker House, Shelter House, and Path of Hope.





The event was held at a new site this year, the beautiful winter low-threshold shelter portion of Johnson County's GuildLink Center at 340 Southgate Avenue, Iowa City. Donation drop-off, set-up and sorting were done on October 17-19, with distribution of clothing on October 20-23. Clothing donations & volunteers came from a wide range of faith communities (e.g., Christian, Muslim, and Buddhist) and organizations. Five representatives from families selected clothing at half-hour intervals, and five volunteers were scheduled in two-hour blocks, all using SignUpGenius. Participants and volunteers wore masks, used hand sanitizer and attempted to maintain distance, facilitated by the use of



grocery shopping carts donate for use by Hy-Vee. Leadership team members for the event were Carolyn Otis, John Barr, Paula Forrest and Jim & Connie Olson. Sincere thanks to members and friends of First Presbyterian Church for your many donations of warm winter wear.
