Нарру November, Church!

Can you believe we are only a week away from Thanksgiving? With the extended summer we have been experiencing, and many trees still holding on to their leaves, it somehow doesn't feel possible that we are coming up to it. When I lived in Ankeny, I always enjoyed participating in a joint Thanksgiving service held by a number of the congregations, which was a chance to get together, have an ecumenical choir, see how some of my colleagues approached the task of preaching Thanksgiving, and, most importantly, eat pie afterwards.



Most of you know that the first year of the Plymouth colony didn't happen quite like we learned in elementary school, but probably do know that it was Abraham Lincoln (likely influenced by Sarah Josepha Hale) who inaugurated the tradition of setting aside a day in November for national Thanksgiving. If you read Lincoln's first proclamation for a November Thanksgiving or his earlier proclamations for national days of Thanksgiving, you can see that he does not shy away from the ongoing war, or the death and destruction that were its result. While he certainly highlights the people in rebellion as the cause of the war, he also includes them in his story of America, calling for all Americans to set aside time for penitence because of **our** national failures. I have heard it said that it was the Civil War that changed our national identity from "these United States" to "the United States," that this enormous fracture of our sense of what it meant to be American resulted in a new story that we told ourselves and the world. In Lincoln's proclamation, you can see that storytelling at work. To lay the blame solely on the Confederacy would legitimize the Confederacy, and so he could not simply declare them outside the bounds of national identity; it could not be "us" vs. "them", because there was only "us".

In our current national moment, I think about the Civil War, and the run-up to it, a lot. In an atomized world, it becomes ever harder to tell a story of "us" that incorporates large numbers of people, and the challenge often overcomes all our earnest efforts. Which is one reason why I take the Day of Thanksgiving so seriously. I was delighted one year in Massachusetts when a nearby Whole Foods Market declared themselves open on Thanksgiving, only to have the Attorney General visit them and say, "no, you aren't. And neither is anybody else, for it is illegal in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts."

Not only is it a day for giving thanks to God even in the midst of challenge, not only is it a day for national repentance for the suffering we cause in the world, not only is it a time to remember widows and orphans. It is also a day for the future, a day where we are free to ask what makes us who we think we are, to form an identity aside from work and expectation, and to write a new story about what it means to be this thing we call the United States of America.


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"Comfort, comfort ye my people; tell of peace! thus says our God..."

Hello, First Family!

As we creep slowly closer to the darkest, coldest season of the year, be comforted by the warmth of God's love. 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alongside my friend and colleague Katelyn Peterson, Director of Music at FPC Marion. We will then move the circus tent of musicians to FPC Marion on Sunday, December 10 (9 a.m.) and do it all over again for their congregation. (Regular weekly service will still happen at FPC Iowa City on Sunday, December 10, 10:30 a.m.).

This all, of course, creates more stress than necessary for myself, but it is nonetheless exciting! I am hopeful that you all will find seasonal excitement and comfort in all of it. The world is indeed a dark and scary place, but be of good faith! There is a light soon rising, that gracious Light—pure brightness of the ever-living God in heaven: Jesus Christ, holy and blessed.

Come and see them on Sunday, December 10 from 10–10:30 a.m., right before worship!






Do you hear what I hear?

By giving to the Christmas Joy Offering of the Presbyterian Church (USA), you honor God's gift of Jesus Christ by providing assistance to current and retired church workers in their time of need and developing our future leaders at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges that equip communities of color.

The Christmas Joy Offering has been a cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930s. The Offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families. Presbyterian-related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage. Recent outcomes from the Christmas Joy Offering include:

- \$1.1 million in gifts from 2021 are being used to provide critical financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their times of need.
- **26 countries** have been represented in the last 25 years at Presbyterian Pan American School.
- 98% of graduates from the Menaul School, a PC (USA)related, grades 6–12, college preparatory school in Albuquerque, New Mexico, go on to college.
- 84% of faculty at Stillman, an historically Back College/ University hold terminal degrees.





2023 Warm Winter Wear Distribution

Activities for Consultation of Religious Communities (CRC) annual distribution of warm winter wear were held October 8–14, at 340 Southgate Avenue (the alternative winter shelter), in Iowa City.

Communications with the public about the distribution were emailed to local social service agencies, KCRG, Iowa City and Clear Creek Amana Public Schools, Community Food Pantries and Neighborhood Centers. Families were required to have one adult member register for a 30-minute shopping session via SignUp Genius.

Faith communities with membership in CRC, and others in lowa City and Coralville, received information requesting donations and volunteers. Donations were received from 21 faith communities and six organizations (including KCRG, which provided 120 new coats via its "Coats for Kids" program). First Presbyterian Church (FPC) received

an amazing number of clothing donations, including 60 new hooded winter coats (in children's sizes 10–12, 14/16, 18 and adult XL / XXL sizes) funded by our Reconciliation Ministry, Health Ministry and Outreach.

Volunteers from 24 faith communities and agencies/organizations signed up on SignUp Genius. They served as one-on-one assistants for each family representative, helped find desired items, kept track of the number of items selected, put items into bags, and helped participants out to their cars. Our FPC volunteers were: Ann Argall, John & Rhonda Barr, Liz Bolin, John Clark, Nancy Gardner, Mary Jo Keith, Rob Ketterer, Jim & Mary Linn, Alex Marsh, Tom Martin, Barb Meier, Chris Miller, Nancy Ross, Janie Schomberg, and Mary Ellen Stamp.

Households served: 377 from:

Iowa City 300 / Coralville 60 / North Liberty 8 / Tiffin 6 / Other 3

Coats Distributed: 1561

873 Children, sizes 0 –8 and 688 Adults: Sizes S–XXXXL (Comparison: 2022–342 households, 1867 coats)

We were unable to meet the needs of at least 100 children needing sizes 1–18; many high school youth needed coats that are adult sizes.

Our plans for the future include recruiting younger individuals for our Leadership Team, securing permission to use the 340 Southgate facility from the Johnson County Board of Supervisors by early Spring, having faith communities and community organizations start earlier to collect coats of all sizes, and increasing numbers of gloves/mittens, scarves, boots and snow pants for all ages.

Sincere thanks to FPC members and friends for their many lovely donations of warm winter wear and for volunteering for the many activities that made up the Warm Winter Wear Distribution.

Honoring Your Wishes at FPC

There is often a wide gap between what we hope will happen surrounding the end of our lives and what actually happens.

STATISTICS ILLUSTRATE THE GAP: 92% of Americans say it is important to discuss their wishes for end-of-life care, yet only 32% have had that conversation (The Conversation Project National Survey, 2018).

Why does FPC have a program to have conversations with you about end of life decisions?

Faith communities are existing groups of people of all ages that are committed to living according to shared values. Faith communities encourage living with more compassion and less fear — things we all need if we are going to engage in these kinds of tender conversations. Faith communities are story-telling communities — and much of this work is about sharing our stories: what happened when someone died; what works and what doesn't; what we hope and what we fear. The seeds of cultural change are often planted in faith communities, and we need culture change to normalize these conversations. Faith communities are positioned to support people with serious illnesses and their families, as well as clinicians who care for the seriously ill.

What a Bargain!

Three years ago I was out for a walk when I received a call from Nancy Gardner asking if it was a good time to talk so of course I said yes. Nancy wanted to share with me the work that FPC does with providing education in Pasrur, Pakistan. Nancy and I are both retired educators so I am sure she knew this would pique my interest. She explained to me the history FPC has with Pasrur and that we provide education for girls in Pasrur who are too poor to afford to go on their own. I learned that for \$500 (now \$550) a person can provide a full year of school for a girl, living in poverty. But that is not all, the money pays for the girls books, uniforms and dormitory housing in addition to the actual instruction. Wow, all of that for \$550!

As I have learned more by working with Friends of Pasrur, I learned that the girls stay in a dormitory because it is not safe for them to walk back and forth to school. I also learned that many girls go on to higher education and careers. This gift is not a way to improve education opportunities for these girls, it is their only opportunity for an education. I went home and talked with my husband, Gary, sharing what I had learned and we agreed this was a great way to give a young girl an education. Q3 Financial Update

As the third quarter of 2023 draws to a close, we would like to update you on the financial aspect of the work we have been doing to share the Word of God through Jesus Christ and to live lives of Justice, Mercy, and Faith. In January, we passed a budget that projected the cost of living into this vision at \$550,145.75. Based on pledging commitments and historical income from other sources, we projected income of \$468,224, with the balance of \$81,921.75 to come from our annual endowment disbursement and our cash reserves.

As of the end of the third quarter, we have spent \$393,976.23, which is roughly on target for our budget. At the same time, your generosity has given us income of \$388,235.61! This is a little bit above our budget expectations, due in large part to some windfall income that we don't expect to see next year. At the current rate of spending and giving, we anticipate needing to



fund around \$53,000 from our annual endowment disbursement and our cash reserves. While this number is lower than the \$82,000 we had budgeted in January, it still represents a significant opportunity to grow into the vision laid out in our budget this year and into the future.

Give Glory to God, recognize a loved one, and beautify our sanctuary this Christmas!
