By giving to the Christmas Joy Offering of the Presbyterian Church (USA), you honor God's gift of Jesus Christ by providing assistance to current and retired church workers in their time of need and developing our future leaders at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges that equip communities of color.

The Christmas Joy Offering has been a cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930s. The Offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families. Presbyterian-related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage. Samples of Christmas Joy Offering outcomes:

- \$1.1 million in gifts from 2021 are being used to provide critical financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their times of need.
- **26 countries** have been represented in the last 25 years at Presbyterian Pan American School.
- 98% of graduates go on to college from the Menaul School, a PC (USA)-related, grades 6–12, college preparatory school in Albuquerque, New Mexico.
- 84% of faculty at Stillman College hold terminal degrees.

Lo, I am with you always ... until the end of the ages, Jesus, the Incarnation of God, promised in his great commission. And that, my friends, is a glimpse of grace.




Organ Project Update

Glad tidings of great joy! The organ project to replace the instrument's electrical systems is moving forward. We've signed a contract for the project with Patrick Budelier Pipe Organ Services, and parts are on order. The suppliers are based in Vancouver, Washington, and Lich, Germany. We expect the parts shipments to take a few months to arrive in lowa City, as the organ building world is experiencing the same supply chain and workforce issues as other sectors of the economy. Once the parts are here, we'll set a timeline for the onsite work.

On our Phelps Organ, the key action is mechanical, but the stop action (switches) controlling the air to the pipes is electrical, with electronic solid-state registration aids. In the accompanying pictures, you can see some of the components inside the organ case that are currently malfunctioning and will be replaced. These include solenoids or "slider motors" that turn a stop (or sound) on and off, computer cards, and wiring that relays electrical signals.

Background

Among other things, I'm a community organizer, a seeker of reconciliation, a lover of both Welsh hymnody and the Iona Community, and a firm believer that children should be seen and heard, especially in church. I worked for software and networking companies in New England and the UK for seven years before discerning a call to ministry, and graduated from Harvard Divinity School in 2010. For the next three years, I spent time as a father, a middle school wrestling referee, a community band trombone player, and (much to the amusement of all my classmates) a Cooperative Baptist Campus Minister in Cullowhee, North Carolina (an hour west of Montreat!), before being called to Ankeny and my ministry to Ankeny United Church of Christ and the broader community. In Ankeny, I was proud to lead the church when it became the first LGBTQ+affirming church in Ankeny, a founding member of A Mid-Iowa Organizing Strategy's Ankeny cluster of churches, a lead sponsor of the first Ankeny Juneteenth celebration, and the supplier of thousands of pounds of fresh produce to local food pantries every

Since Divinity school, I've pursued training in pastoral counseling at the Des Moines Pastoral Counseling Center, in relational organizing with the Industrial Areas Foundation, in antiracism work from a variety of sources, and, in preparation for sabbatical stays on organic farms in France, in gardening through Iowa State's Extension Office. This year, I am one of the inaugural fellows at United Theological Seminary's Leadership Center for Social Justice. As an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, I have also been busy receiving regular briefings in Presbyterian history and polity from my many Presbyterian friends around the country.

Family life

My spouse, Dr. Elizabeth Yale is an Assistant Professor at the University of Iowa with a joint appointment in the Department of History and the Center for the Book. Beth and I met in the trombone section of the Yale Precision Marching Band, and so I remain an unabashed low brass partisan, though my 13 year-old daughter Martha plays french horn and her 10 year-old brother Teddy plays alto saxophone, among many other activities and interests.

Camp Wyoming Update

Camp Wyoming (CW), a mission of the Presbytery of East Iowa, is a Christian summer camp and year-round retreat center located in Jones County, Iowa. Founded in 1960, CW's vision is to offer transformative experiences that equip people of all ages for a journey of faith. A variety of programs are provided, including a popular summer camp, winter camps, youth retreats, and day events. CW also rents its site and facilities to groups for retreats. 2022 afforded a return to more traditional summer camp life, with 566 campers from 5 countries, 11 states, and 145 churches served via age-grouped sessions of various lengths and themes. This summer, campers planted 6,300 tree seedlings, recited 3,380 Bible memory verses, and took 2,478 trips down the slip 'n slide. Pictured below are two of FPC's 2022 high school graduates, brothers Ben and Charlie Faden, who enjoyed their roles as camp counselors, and our only camper this year, Vivian Adams.







Vivian shared this testimony about camp: "Camp Wyoming felt like a family the minute I got there. Everybody included me and I felt at home there. Camp Wyoming had all these new opportunities, and it felt amazing to be there."

In addition to CW's tiered registration fee, FPC has in past years provided financial support to help children attend this summer camp. We hope to resume this support next year. CW is in the process of developing new strategic and master site plans. A forester was hired to oversee a management plan for the future of the camp's forest. A fund-raising campaign is currently underway to update camp cabins with new siding, new flooring, and other features.

Session-Supported Catholic Worker House Grant Funded

lowa City's Catholic Worker House (CWH) was recently notified by the Presbyterian Hunger Program that the grant application from Escucha Mi Voz Iowa, an immigrant-led Congregation-Based Community Organization of the CWH, had been approved. The \$8,000 in funding has an option for a two-year renewal. In May, Session provided a letter of support for this grant.

Escucha Mi Voz Iowa helps oversee two CWH facilities, including the one in Iowa City at 1414 Sycamore St., for immigrants and refugees to live for up to two years while they rebuild their lives in Iowa. The houses currently provide living quarters for two dozen immigrants and refugees, mostly single parents and children, all working to establish independence. Related support includes connecting them with legal, educational, and other support and services.

In recent years, FPC's Reconciliation Ministry has donated money and encouraged volunteers to cook, serve meals, and interact with immigrants and refugees at the CWH. As part of our Kindness Campaign, on 9/24, FPC volunteers prepared and served the afternoon meal at the CWH.



Warm Winter Wear Distribution

The Consultation of Religious Communities, of which FPC is a member, gave away 1867 coats from Wednesday, 10/19, through Friday, 10/21. This consisted of 1325 coats for children (sizes 3 month—size 18, boys and girls) and 542 coats for adults (sizes S—XXXL, men and women). All scarves, boots, and gloves were given away. We had a total of more than 300 family representatives who attended, and many of the individuals were shopping for a minimum of 8 people.

Unfortunately, we had to contact those who had hoped to shop on Saturday because we were all out of popular clothes. Most of our items were actually gone by Thursday afternoon. We were unable to meet the needs of at least 95 children from sizes 10 - 18, especially 14/16/18 (including both boys and girls). Adult coats were in demand, and we could have used many more coats of all sizes. Donations were received from a large number of faith communities and from KCJJ's *Coats for Kids*.

28 brand new coats for children, sizes 2 and 3 (and a couple size 4/5), and the few remaining hats were



given to the Catholic Worker House, which supports many immigrant families.

Thank you to the more than 80 volunteers who sorted and organized clothing and served as shopper assistants. This help was invaluable. Many individuals from a range of faith communities signed up to assist, and some service organizations were represented among the volunteers. Thank you so much for participating in the 2022 *Warm Winter Wear Distribution*!




A Big Thank You! from the Stewardship Committee

Session Meeting Highlights

The Session met Tuesday, October 18, 2022 at 7 p.m. in Coover Lounge at FPC. Interim Rev. Frosty Krummel called the meeting to order and declared a quorum.



Elder Bill Follows offered an opening prayer.

Minutes of the September 20, 2022 stated Session meeting and October 11, 2022 called Session meeting were approved.

A motion to set October 30, 2022, after worship service, for the next Congregational meeting to elect officers was approved.

Baptism of Matilda Bergman, daughter of Leah Bergman and Gunner Grado will take place December 4, 2022.

Administration committee is recommending that staff adopt and be trained in new software, Microsoft 365, in the near future.

Buildings and Grounds committee member Elder John Barr opened a brief discussion concerning B&G's action proposal that Session convene a task force to formulate a viable alternative energy plan for FPC. This will involve setting up a task force consisting of interested FPC folks. Each Session member was asked to come with two names for possible task force members by the November 15, 2022 Session meeting.

The Christian Education motion to hold a cereal drive for November was approved. The cereal will be donated to the CommUnity Food Pantry.

FPC treasurer, Ken Miller, is invited to attend all Session meetings.

Session went into Executive session to discuss staffing revision. After a decision was made, Elder Lara Marsh's motion to come out of Executive session was approved.

Reconciliation Ministry member Elder Jane Cranston said she would bring up the issue of accepting donations for improvements of the PEB's Pasrur Christian School after the Stewardship campaign. Elder John Barr gave an update to the grant request from Presbyterian (USA) Hunger for Escucha Mi Voz Iowa, the immigrant-led CBCO sister organization of the Iowa City Catholic Worker House (CWH) of Hospitality. CWH received a contract from Presbyterian USA Hunger approving the \$8,000 grant request.

Rev. Krummel led us in closing with the Lord's Prayer.

The next FPC stated session meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 15, 2022, at 7 p.m. in Coover Lounge. Minutes submitted by interim Clerk Nancy Weber.

October 30, 2022 Congregational Meeting for the Election of Officers

October 30, 2022 Called Session Meeting




Pastor Krummel closed with prayer.
